In answer to a letter from Edwin Morrison in regard to motor car service of the Joseph branch, William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O-W. R. & N. company, has answered as follows:

Mrs. Edgar Marvin Died at Enterprise last Night

Daughter of Pioneers of Union County Passes Away—Two Brothers, J. W. Oliver and Turner Oliver, Live in La Grande.

Word was received this morning from Enterprise that Mrs. Edgar Marvin died there last night and that the funeral will be in Wallowa tomorrow. Mrs. Marvin was the daughter of W. H. Oliver and Julia Ann Oliver, early pioneers of Union county. She was the youngest of a family of seven, and the first to pass away.

She leaves her husband, Edgar Marvin, for many years sheriff of Wallowa county, and two daughters and a son, Julia Marvin and Ronald Marvin, who live in Enterprise besides the following brothers: E. W. Oliver, living in Portland; Turner Oliver and J. W. Oliver, residing at La Grande; Marshall Oliver of Zilla, Washington; Arthur Oliver of Baker, and Charles W. Oliver of Summerville, besides three half brothers, Perry Oliver of La Grande and Frank and Bert Oliver of Summerville.

Mrs. Marvin was born at the old Oliver homestead two and a half miles northwest of Summerville, on May 14, 1870. She received her education in the public schools of Union county and at Ascension school for girls, which was conducted by the Episcopal church at Cove. She lived a useful, busy Christian life, a thorough life of service, and was beloved by everybody who knew her.

Bernard Shaw Says It Is A Great Speech

Great Dramatist Says President Wilson's Address in the Senate Is "Most Remarkable Since Lincoln Spoke."

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) With the British Armies in France, Jan. 31.—G. Bernard Shaw regards President Wilson's speech to the senate "the most remarkable utterance since Lincoln spoke." The famous satirist, novelist, dramatist and author paid the American president this compliment while on a visit to the British front.

"I consider his speech stupendously important," he declared. "With one stroke he has set America on the right track again. It never understood the imperial America of Roosevelt—but Wilson has rehabilitated American democracy. The country of Lincoln has refound itself."

Asked for his interpretation of the phrase "peace without victory," Shaw responded: "Peace based upon justice—that's all. It's perfect nonsense for the people to believe Wilson is Germany's catspaw or that he advocates a German made peace."

Shaw visited Arras, wearing a steel trench helmet, which gave him a remarkable resemblance to Don Quixote. Shaw said he was glad to visit the front. "Because," he added, characteristically, "I hate war and now I'll be able to discuss war with people who understand. The soldiers hate war too. They know what it is. You can't talk war with civilians—their belligerent attitude is plain torture."

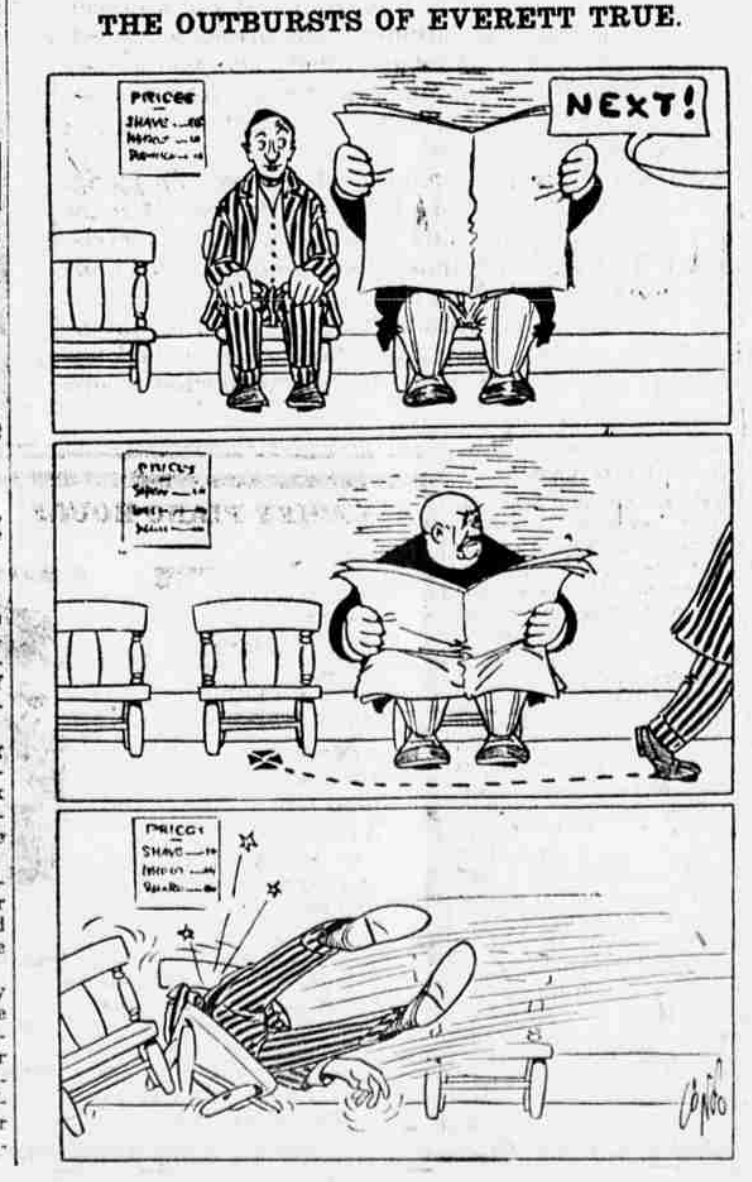
