A Washington expert has a plan for developing from California waste gas oil worth 2 cents a gallon, which may be made into gasoline at a cost of 6 cents.

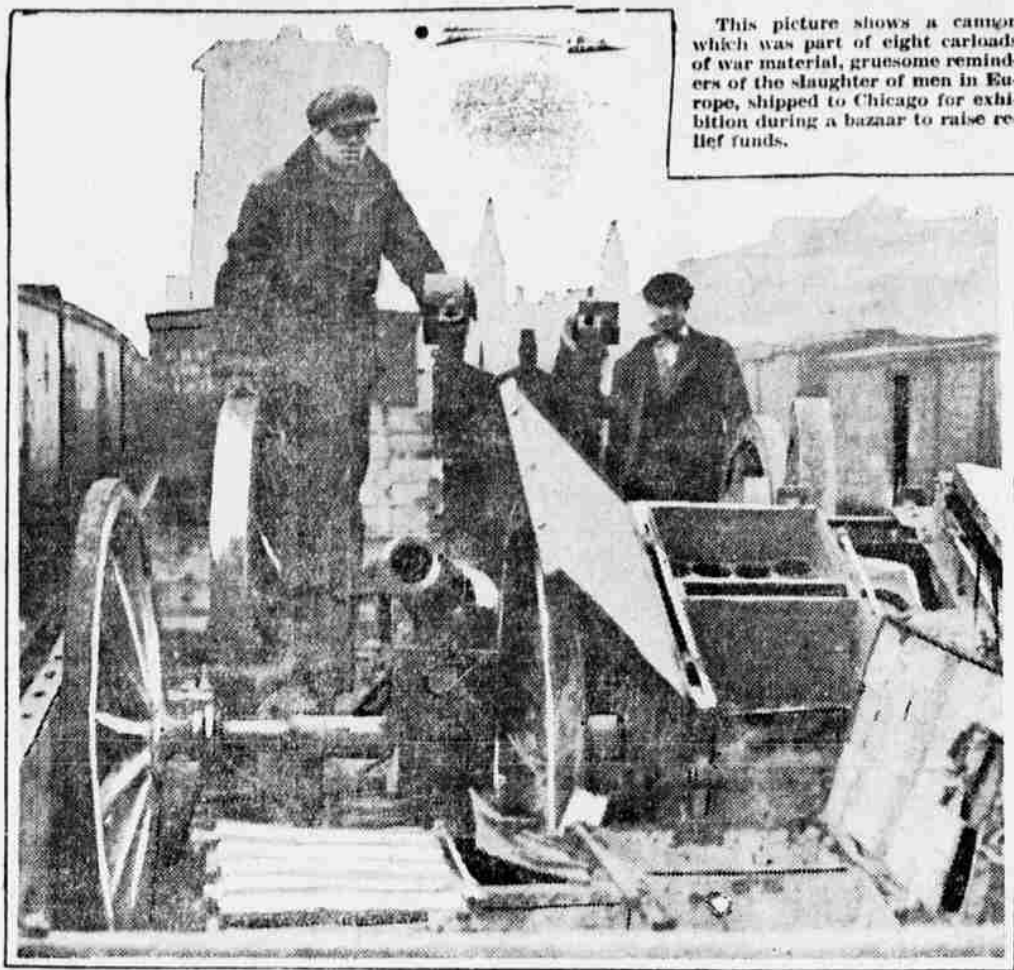

Sir Hedley le Bas, the advertising man who is "running the British Nation" is quoted as saying:
