LEAK PROBERS ARE GETTING SOME CLEWS

HUTTON TICKER AGENCY GOT CONFIDENTIAL TIP ON PEACE NOTE AND SPREAD THE NEWS BROADCAST.

New York, Jan. 31.—(United Press)—Leak probers asked George Ellis, a member of the Hutton Brokerage firm, to return from Georgia and explain the Hutton leak message.

Probers ascertained the following facts: On December 20 at 11 a. m., Secretary Lansing confidentially told the reporters the note was forthcoming.

At 1:15, Hutton gave information to his client. At 2 o'clock the stock ticket carried rumors.

Telegrapher P. A. McConnolly wired the note tip from Washington shortly after Secretary Lansing met the reporters.

The probers summoned Connolly and will ask who gave him the message.

bill validating all acts in connection with the establishment of Deschutes county. It carries an emergency clause. Senator Baldwin explained that Crook county citizens withdrew their protests against establishment of a separate county.

The senate passed Hawley's bill providing that manufacturers of butter and cheese operate under the state dairy and food commission. The state dairymen requested the passage of the bill.

The house defeated the Rogue river fish bill. It lacked two votes of the necessary majority.

Bank Committee Tonight. Salem, Ore., Jan. 31.—(United Press)—The house banking committee will meet tonight for a public hearing on the bill to regulate trust companies. This measure has passed the senate, and is now pending in the house.
