Imbler, Ore., Jan. 27, 1917.—(To the Editor) of The Observer—I must say the high cost of living has interested me more or less in the last year for various reasons. I must say I heartily agree with Mr. Dyal. There is more truth than imagination in his assertion. Basing his arguments upon the fact that we are short of production, we would naturally ask the question—why? It is true beyond the power of successful contradiction that there must be a cause. No offense intended—I fail to see where Mr. Garrick has a just reason for stating that Mr. Dyal's statistics are utterly unreliable. They are absolutely correct and I might add that a few references to some of our agricultural reports will convince most of us that we have not made even a casual investigation of the subject in hand. Mere assertions do not prove anything and sarcasm never defeats facts. We are all capable of judging between inflated sophistic bombast and logic, but a little airing and brushing always takes away the mold, removes rubbish and gives things a brighter hue. No one doubts the fact that we are in arrears when it comes to the preservation of our soil. We in the Grande Ronde are blessed with the richest kind of land but if we had to meet the situation that confronts other localities we would be compelled to think more seriously, and manage differently—ascertaining clearly that it was no idle jest that we imported from Germany in 1913 \$13,347,341 worth of Kanit, potash and salt. We increase that to \$16,803,237 in 1914. Statistics are the only recourse we have to go to and it will take a man possessed of more ingenuity than Mr. Garrick to belittle them to where we will feel more safe in placing our confidence in mere assertions instead of facts. The wise man, Solomon, said: "He that judges a matter before he hears it, is not wise." I pity the being who attempts to live on 10 or 15 cents worth of food a day. The wind would have little trouble getting around him.

In the days of ancient Israel they preserved their land by giving it a rest every seven years. We have not scientifically tried to save our soil but on the other hand we've been dependent upon artificial fertilizer to keep it producing. No wonder we are astonished when our attention is called to the fact that the war caught us napping and unprepared to meet the situation. I am not in sympathy with

at this time, to find something to take the place of potash. With it selling at \$500 per ton there is promise of great profit. Potash has been taken from seaweed, feldspar and the waste of cement mills. But it has been impossible to satisfy the demand, and there are estimates that the domestic output does not exceed 10 per cent of the quantity formerly bought from Germany.
