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NEWS FROM NEIGHBORING TOWNS

Enterprise News Items

James A. Simmons and J. W. Alford, Pioneers, Are Dead—County Fair Stockholders Re-elected.

Enterprise, Ore., Feb. 2.—The Record Chieftain says:

James Alfred Simmons, one of the pioneers of the county, died Saturday, January 27, 1917, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arch Alford, in Enterprise. He had been in poor health several weeks. The funeral was held Monday morning in the Federated church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. J. Adams. Burial was in the Upper Prairie creek cemetery.

Mr. Simmons was born in Missouri, April 15, 1844, and moved with his parents to Iowa when a small child. He crossed the plains to the Walla Walla valley in 1873, and in the fall of 1879 he came to the Wallowa country, settling near Joseph.

He homesteaded the land where J. A. Eggleston's fine home now stands and lived there some years. After leaving it he rented land in this part of the county and moved from place to place considerably. Thirteen years ago he made a new start in life, buying a small place on Trout creek about nine miles north of Enterprise. Although then 60 years old he went to work with a will. His stock increased and he put to use the experience he had gained farming Wallowa county land, and had just got into comfortable circumstances when he succumbed to his last illness.

Through his earlier years Mr. Simmons had made little progress in a material way, largely because of his generosity and kindness to those about him. He always was ready to drop his own work to help a friend or neighbor, and in any transaction was so anxious to deal fairly with his fellow man that he generally forgot to look closely after his own interests. He lived quietly and simply, seldom coming to town, devoted to his family and home life.

Mr. Simmons was married, July 10, 1879, to Cynthia Isabelle Sample, at Walla Walla. She died 8 years ago at the home on Trout creek. To this union 10 children were born, of whom eight survive: Mrs. Arch Alford, Enterprise; Mrs. D. S. Burdette and Mrs. V. S. Watson, Joseph; Della M. Simmons, Charles A. Simmons, Laura M. Simmons, Mrs. H. E. Hudson and Beatrice E. Simmons, all of Enterprise.

J. W. Alford died Saturday night, January 27, 1917, at the home in town which he and his family had been occupying two weeks, since they came in from Chico. The funeral was held on Monday in the Federated church, conducted by Rev. A. J. Adams, and burial was in the Enterprise cemetery.

For more than a year Billy Alford, as his scores of friends knew him, had been failing from tuberculosis. Last winter, when his wife and one of their girls were at the hospital, it could be seen that Mr. Alford was not as strong as he had been. He returned to his ranch north of the Chesnimus and seemed to be holding his own. But when in town in the fall it was apparent he was weaker and the many solicitous inquiries concerning his health showed the esteem in which he was held by all.

M. K. Bue and C. E. Lovell have bought of L. D. Moulton the Enterprise bakery and are now conducting it. Mr. Moulton has moved to McMinnville, his former home, as Mrs. Moulton's health here had been very poor and it is hoped a return to a lower altitude and warmer climate will benefit her.

Mrs. Marion Langston, who has been very critically ill with blood poison, was so much improved yesterday that the attending physician reported he believed she was out of danger. While handling a meat saw two weeks ago today, her left thumb received a small cut, hardly more than a series of pin pricks that barely broke the skin. She thought nothing of it.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wallowa County Fair association, held Saturday afternoon in the court house, the former directors and officers were re-elected. The financial report showed all expenses and fixed charges paid after the exhibit last fall, and the stockholders hope to continue the good work until the debts of the association are all paid. Then they will be able to make more permanent improvements on the grounds, and to conduct a still better fair.

The splendid showing made the last two years was an unanswerable argument in favor of retaining the officers who had achieved such results, and their re-election was the logical and happy result. None of them wanted to continue the labor involved, but all were too loyal to the fair, and too anxious to have the association placed on a clear footing to refuse re-election. The executive committee is: Sam Wade, Hugh Wilson, Jay H. Dobbin, Carl Whitmore, Wesley Duncan, C. H. Zurecher, W. C. Dorrance, W. R. Holmes, A. C. Miller and W. C. Hinterman. The officers: President, Mr. Whitmore; vice-president, Mr. Dobbin; treasurer, W. R. Holmes; secretary, Mr. Miller.

William Vanderford has purchased the barber shop formerly owned by Shelby Jones, the deal having been completed the latter part of last week

and Mr. Vanderford taking charge Saturday.

On the anniversary of the great snow storm of last year, a touch of the same kind of weather was felt in the county the first of the week. A foot of snow fell in the open part of the county, and nearly two feet in the timbered belt at the north. Highways were filled and made almost impassable. The heaviest fall of snow was Saturday night, when eight or ten inches were added in the open country to that already on the ground. The two nights following saw several inches more added, and persistent winds filled roads and paths level full and packed the snow hard. In the timber the fall, although heavier, was not packed by wind. At the Sled Springs forest station Ranger Carpenter said over the telephone last evening the snow was 53 inches deep. It was perhaps a few inches deeper at Billy Meadows. Since Saturday 21 inches of snow had fallen.

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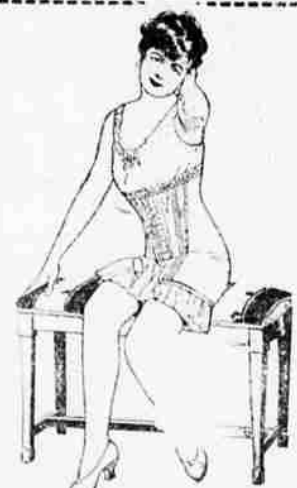
