Company Formed To Handle Tractor

A company has been recently formed to handle the Universal Tractor in Union and Wallowa counties. This is the machine for which the farmer has been waiting.

The mechanism of the car is not altered in any way, and by removing the attachment, the car can be converted into a pleasure car again with very little work. It can be used for heavy hauling without damage to the roads, so that when not busy in the fields it can be utilized to bring produce to market at a great saving of time and expense over that of horse-drawn transportation.

Being constructed of structural steel castings, throughout, the Universal is practically indestructible, and the only part which could ever need replacement is the pinion gear, which can be replaced at a very small cost.
