12 submerged. Each is expected to patrol a 10-mile radius and each is said to have 6 torpedoes, 2 rapid fire guns, bomb-laying chambers, and a large supply of bombs and grenades. They are said to carry five weeks' provisions each.

WATTS WATT TALKS NO. 2

Watts a watt.—Why, it is a quantity of electricity. Of course you cannot see it, or lift it or measure it in a cup, but you can make it just as real to yourself by thinking of it in terms of what it will do as if you could do those things with it. For instance, if the apparatus using the electricity was perfect, a watt would lift 44 pounds one foot in one minute; by using Mazda (tungsten) incandescent lamps it will make nearly as much light as one candle; it will give as much heat as a piece of coal about the size of commonly used electric light bulbs.

You can readily see that this is quite a small quantity so, for the same reason that the word "ton" was invented to stand for 2000 pounds, so the word "Kilowatt" was invented to stand for 1000 watts.

Naturally, the quantity of electricity you use depends on how long you use it. If you use a watt for an hour the quantity you use is called a "watt-hour." If you use it 1000 hours or use 1000 watts for one hour, the quantity would be a "Kilowatt-Hour." Now since this is an unhandy word to write out we abbreviate it "K.W.H."

Take for example a 40 watt (32 candlepower) Mazda lamp. If you burn it two hours in the morning and three hours at night, or a total of five hours for the day you will have used 5x40 or 200 watt-hours. Remembering that a kilowatt-hour is a thousand watt-hours, your lamp consumed 2-10 of a K.W.H. during the five hours burning.
