Taft Says War Is Upon Us.

New York, Feb. 5.—Conscription to build up an army for the country's defense "now the war is on us" and for the future as well was advocated here Sunday by former President William H. Taft in an address on the League to Enforce Peace before the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences.

"Stirred as the people are by enthusiasm," at the break with Germany, they would support a conscription measure. Mr. Taft believed, "not only to meet the situation, but for the future after war shall end."

In one sentence Mr. Taft said: "Now that the war is on us" indicating that he thought the present crisis would bring on war.

Red Cross Prepares For Active Relief Work.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Identical telegrams ordering immediate preparations for active war relief work were dispatched Sunday by the American Red Cross headquarters here to 265 chapters throughout the country. First aid classes are to be organized and other preparations begun on a broad scale.

Brazil May Break With Germany.

Rio Janeiro, Feb. 5.—The foreign minister, Dr. Lauro Muller, has been in conference during the last 24 hours with President Wenceslau Braz and with members of the diplomatic corps. He is also in constant communication with the Brazilian embassy at Washington. The Brazilian reply to the German note regarding naval warfare probably will be made known today. There is reason to believe the attitude maintained by Brazil up to the present time will undergo a change as a result of recent developments.
