PRICE OF OLD LOVE PLACED AT \$15,000, NEW YORK WIDOW MUST PAY

The price of old love has been set at \$15,000 by a decree of Judge Finch in New York in the alienation suit of Mrs. Frederick Weaver, 51, against Mrs. Caroline W. Frame, 74, and a widow. 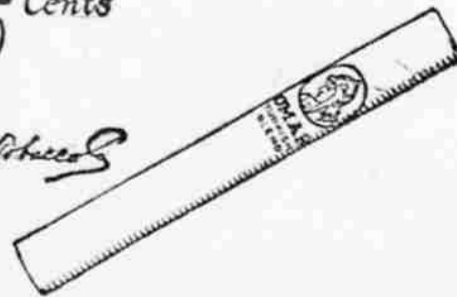
