ing's and paid him \$800. A contract was given by Schilling whereby the city officials believed the city was freed from any further claim for damages to property of Schillings "from any improvement of the street." Schilling now contends that the contract and improvement referred to meant only the subway, and not any other kind of improvement. Acting on the opposite belief, that the city is released from damages to the property "from any improvement," the commission recently refused to recognize a claim for damages from Schilling. Schilling wrote a letter to the commission in which he said that under the circumstances he would like to sell his property, about two acres, to the city for \$4000. He claimed that

the proposed viaduct would so injure his property that he would not care to live near the viaduct. The commission believed that Schilling had not right to damages from the city, in view of the contract, and further, that the valuation he placed upon his property was exorbitant.

Commissioner McKennon said that he could buy a larger and a better piece of property nearby for \$2500. Attorney Ivanhoe explained that he did not know Schilling had written the commission a letter and said that his client's true position was the belief that his property would be depreciated in value \$2000 by the structure. Commissioner McKennon said he believed that viaduct would be an improvement to Schilling's property rather than a detriment. "He might get a chance to sell it now," said Mr. McKennon.

Because Commissioner Brownton was not familiar with the property and desired to visit it before he voted the commission deferred making a final decision until next Wednesday night.

According to the city manager's report to the commission, efforts to have property owners pay their street assessments will be continued but that, after a reasonable time, if no other means were available, the collections would be placed in the hands of the legal department.

The chief of police's report for January showed nine arrests for drunkenness, six for disturbance of the peace, three for petty and outside officers, one for beating, two for assault and battery, one for peddling without a license. Fourteen were convicted, five paroled and three remain in jail. Fines collected amounted to \$72.50; two head of stock were impounded; one horse was sold for \$4.75; and six "sleepers," men who had no other beds, were accommodated at the jail.

The city manager's detailed report follows:

Fire chief reports no fires for the week, five electric inspections and the glass broken from one fire box. There has been so much tampering with fire alarm boxes that we have deemed it expedient to print cards to be tacked in the vicinity of each alarm box, offering a reward of \$25 for information leading to the conviction of any person destroying or tampering with said boxes.

The fire chief has had a team and sled loaded with hose to be used in case of a call where fire truck could not be taken on account of the excessive snow. The sled service has been discontinued by reason of the fact that the streets are now open and the fire truck available.

Street superintendent show an expense account for the week of \$46.56 which includes work done in conjunction with the county. Have kept the gutters and catch basins cleaned and crosswalks shoveled out.

Water superintendent hands in an expense account of \$37.10 for the week, which includes expenses for thawing out freeze-ups. All freeze-ups have been thawed and the force has been reduced to one man.

Intake attendant reports, over the phone, that there is about nine feet of water in the reservoir.

Have taken up past due accounts with a number of property owners making it plain to them that these accounts must be settled. Some have paid, others are making arrangements to do so. Think an appreciable showing will be made within the next 50 days.

We appreciate the fact that it is of vital importance to the city that these collections be made, and, after having given a reasonable time for settlement will proceed, through the legal department, to force collections.

Chief of police reports for the week show total arrests five, three drunken, one disorderly and one for violation of pool hall ordinance, number of convictions five, number of meals served 41, amount of fines collected \$55.
