Valentine Party Supper Menu

First.—Toast hearts spread with some potted pelish, as anchovy paste.

Second.—Creamed oysters in heart shaped patty shells or paper cases.

Third.—Cold beef tongue or ham sliced and cut into heart shaped figures with a cookie cutter, bread and butter sandwiches, lettuce with mayonnaise, coffee.

Fourth.—Grapefruit filled with pine apple and chopped cherries and nuts. Valentine cakes and almonds.

Another menu which makes a very relishing supper:

First.—Tomato bouillon, toast hearts.

Second.—Creamed chicken and mushrooms decorated with tiny hearts cut from red peppers, wheat bread sandwiches filled with cress and mayonnaise.

Third.—Cold macedoine of vegetables decorated with hearts, beets cut

in heart shape, served in head lettuce; toasted crackers with hearts shaped on their surface of cream cheese and raspberry jam.

Fourth.—Strawberry parfait with whipped cream in lady finger cases, pink cakes and candles and salted almonds, coffee.

Before St. Valentine's Day.

Long before Rome was converted to Christianity the youths and maids on Feb. 15 annually drew names from two sacred urns in the temple, of those of the opposite sex who fate decreed were to be their sweethearts for the coming year. The early fathers of the church, finding they were powerless to entirely eradicate the pagan practices of the Lupercalia, changed it from Feb. 15 to St. Valentine's day, the 14th.

Valentine Books.

In 1797 a small book, "The Young Men's Valentine Writer," was published for the use of ardent swains who were unable to do their own ryming. In 1812 a less modest volume appeared, "The Cabinet of Love, or Cupid's Repository of Choice Valentines," a very complete compendium.

Cove Has Plans For New Town Charter

Committee of Six Elected at Mass Meeting Thursday Evening to Cooperate With Officials.

Cove, Ore., Feb. 10.—(Special)—The mass meeting held at Macabee hall Thursday evening for the purpose of discussing a city charter was well attended and much interest was shown by the citizens.

The meeting opened with an orchestral selection. Mayor Frank Galloway was elected chairman for the evening and D. H. Weimer, secretary. The mayor defined the purpose of the meeting, stating that Cove had outgrown its present charter, which was adopted in 1904, and that the legality of many of the city's ordinances based on the charter and not specifically covered by the state code, were questioned; that because of the uncertainty of its legal effect, the council and other city officials had hesitated in attempting the enforcement of many existing ordinances or in creating new ones. The consensus of opinion seems to be, in substance, that the council and other city officials have no foundation upon which to work and should have vested in them the authority to create and enforce new ordinances.

Frank Galloway, mayor; Prof. Royal Allen, S. H. Weimer and H. E. Blevins, members of the council; Logan Anderson, Rev. E. O. Otto, Rev. C. C. Pratt, Ed Stearns, J. C. Picton, R. Z. Baxter, Mrs. Janette Knight and Mrs. Minnie McDaniel made short talks urging the present needs and recommending the creation of a new charter.

It is not to be supposed that the "present-conditions-good-enough" element were lacking. They were present but in the minority.

A motion then prevailed authorizing the election, by informal ballot, of six freeholders to cooperate with the mayor and city council in drafting a new charter.

Frank Roberts, Carl Peterson and George Corp. tellers, announced through the chairman that T. G. Wilson, J. E. Trippier, Lou Bloom, L. E. Anderson, R. G. Baxter and A. G. Conklin had been elected.

After adjournment the city council

and committee met in joint session to determine upon a date to draft the new charter, which when completed, will be submitted to the legal voters of the city at a special election.
