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Sage Brush Orchestra Coming to La Grande

Will Fill Chautauqua Engagement Here in June—Burns Famous Children's Organization Was Named By Fred. B. Currey—Youngsters Made Big Hit In Portland and Salem.

Word has been received by the board of directors of the Grande Ronde Chautauqua association that the famous Sagebrush orchestra of Burns will appear in Chautauqua program in this city in June. This splendid orchestra is the product of Harney county and is the musical organization which attracted so much attention and favorable comment last year at the Oregon State Fair and in musical circles in Portland. City Manager Currey claims the honor of having discovered this justly famous aggregation of talented little people and is especially delighted to learn that they are going to pay La Grande a visit.

Currey tells the story of his discovery as follows: "While scouting for state fair exhibits last summer my work took me to Burns where I had thought it possible to secure the usual county exhibit, but upon arriving was met with a condition which made such an exhibit impossible, and naturally I felt a little discouraged. However, I concluded to make the best of it and struck out to look over the town.

"My attention was attracted to what looked like the model for the largest violin ever constructed. The thing was all of twenty feet long and as wide as a hayrack. I could see no earthly use for such a gigantic instrument and promptly began looking for a native of the place to enlighten me. I was lucky and the first man I met was Cal Jordan, an old time La Grande friend. When questioned, he answered, 'That big fiddle was a float for the Fourth of July parade in which the kid orchestra rode.' I wanted to know more and he looked a little surprised but finally made a little sickly grin and remarked, 'I guess you never heard about our kids, so I would advise you to attend the farmers' meeting this afternoon at the experiment station and see how our youngsters can make music.'

"Music has no special attraction for me, but I like children and arranged

to attend the meeting.

"There was surely some surprise in store for me. When the children's number was called and I saw those 30 bright little folks lined up I knew something good was going to happen, and when the number was complete and the audience brought them back for another selection I realized that Harney county had an exhibit worthy of sending to the state fair and that it was up to me to gather them in. Mrs. Dodge, the leader, was found, and invited to bring the Harney county 'kids' to the fair. She expressed a willingness to undertake the problem, but the question of finances loomed up.

"The little people, some thirty strong, accompanied by nearly as many mothers, made the trip. The organization was without a name and I suggested the title of Sagebrush orchestra and so it was christened. The Sagebrush orchestra attended the fair, gave a number of concerts in Portland, and Burns became famous. The people of Burns furnished the money, and the talent; Rex Lammman provided the publicity, and the people of the state reaped the benefit.

"When the 30 little musicians visit La Grande this summer I am certain that our people will agree with me that the discovery was a fortunate one. It may be of interest to know that the violin soloist, Miss Kathleen Jordan was born in La Grande."

Some of the tots are but six and seven years of age but their leader, Mrs. Dodge, has trained them wonderfully. She has notions all her own of helping the children. They gather at her home for practice and when they become tired she takes them for a swim. Then back again they go to their practice.

Not the least of the attractions with the orchestra is a stunted doe which, at a given signal, runs onto the stage and lies down at the feet of one of the smallest of the little girls.

Fliers of the World Meeting in N. Y. Today

New York, Feb. 12.—(United Press)—Bird men from every civilized country on the globe gathered here today for the first Pan-American Aeronautics exposition, which opened at Grand Central Palace under the auspices of the Aero Club of America. It will end February 15.

Flying men and flying machines from the European battle front are on exhibition. Plane wrecked in air fights and airmen wounded above the clouds are part of the show.

The really serious part of the program is the plan that will be advanced by the American Society of Automobile Engineers to make the aeroplane and other air craft standard in all parts, like the automobile. It was this action with regard to autos, President Howard E. Coffin of the Engineers declared today, that gave the United States supremacy in the automobile world.

"Among the speakers will be Prof. L. W. Pawlowski of Michigan, John Barrett of the Pan-American Union, Ambassador de Game of Brazil, Elbert Santos-Dumont, Emerson McMullan, Henry White and others.
