Imbler, Ore., Feb. 12.—(Special)—The Louis Dunlap confectionery was robbed Saturday night by a thief who broke into the store through a panel in the back door and took \$40 from the register. EDITOR BEATEN FOR POST

Enterprise Votes in Favor of Election for \$5,000 School Bonds.

Enterprise, Ore., Feb. 12.—At a special school election held in this city to elect a director to succeed F. A. Clarke, resigned, B. Mayfield, a prominent druggist, defeated George P. Cheney, publisher of the Enterprise Record-Chief, by a vote of 58 to 7. At the same time the vote was cast requesting the board to call a special election for the purpose of voting \$75,000 bonds for the erection of a modern high school building.

To Honor Honest Abe Is Fitting and Proper

Big and Little Today Among Lincoln's Folk, the Mountaineers Observe His Birthday.

Cumberland Gap, Tenn., Feb. 12.—(Special).—Special trains have brought governors, educators, senators and captains of industry here to attend the celebration of Lincoln's birthday under the auspices of Lincoln Memorial university, which is located here.

Lincoln Memorial university was founded just twenty years ago, February 10, by the late General O. O. Howard of Vermont. General Howard commanded the Union forces operating in the Cumberland mountains during the Civil war, and in gratitude to the kindness of the mountain people who, as Lincoln, predicted, helped the Union soldiers in every way they could, General Howard founded at Cumberland Gap the institution now known as Lincoln Memorial university and dedicated to the living memory of the great president, for the education and uplift of the mountain boys and girls.

An effort is being made to raise a \$1,000,000 endowment fund for the institution.

many counter attractions, which arrest and divert our attention from God. In youth, pleasure and excitement usurp our thoughts and energies, and in later life, business and ambition. Unless we begin early to remember God, in the whirl of life, we shall inevitably forget Him. And in forgetting Him, we become more and more estranged from Him, so that the separation is almost complete. Then comes misfortune, the evil days, when all in which we were engaged, in which we delighted and for which we slaved, is swept away. Alas, for the succeeding years, for in them we shall find no pleasure and desire shall fail, as we realize that all for which we toiled and milled, has proved to be vanity or emptiness.

But he who remembered God in spite of all the distractions of the distractions of the world, shall not be cast down, in the days of old age, misfortune and infirmity, because he will be remembered by God. "Remember thy Creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not." Neglect of this admonition is the reason why so many find their religion unavailing in the time of adversity. They lived solely for worldly pleasure, profit and position, and failed to acquire the confidence of a certain faith, and the comfort of a reasonable, religious and holy hope. The fault was in themselves and their bitterness is increased by this knowledge. Their experience is that of the English cardinal, who as he lay on his deathbed, degraded from his former high estate, and bereft of friends and wealth, pathetically acknowledged to an attendant: "Had I but served God as diligently as I have served my king, He would not have given me over in my grey hairs. But this is my due reward for my pains and study, not regarding my service to God, but only my duty to my prince."
