Tomorrow another division of the same class will witness a like demonstration.

ALLIES MAY USE OUR PORTS

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13.—(United Press)—Senator Saulsbury introduced a resolution permitting the Allies warships to use American ports. He said "this might enable the government to prevent violations of the United States' sea rights without declaring war."

It is understood that President Wilson completely approved the resolution. It provides that the Allies warships may enter the United States harbors for the purpose of "capturing, destroying, resisting and escaping from belligerent vessels practicing illegal sea warfare."

It was referred to the senate foreign relations committee. Senator Stone opposed the plan.
