Library Would Like To Be Remembered

During National Pay Up Week, can you not remember that forgotten library fine charged on your unused card? It is not much, but if everybody will pay up who owes a few

cents, enough will be collected to buy several new books. The right of public libraries to impose fines for overdue books has been upheld by court decisions, but except in the case of lost books, the library does not attempt to send out bills. The cost of bookkeeping and postage would be greater than the amounts due in the case of small fines. "Overdue" postal notices are not sent out as duns, but as reminders to the borrower.

WATTS WATT TALK NO. 3

The other day we told you about watts and their relation to your light, power and heat bills. We told you how you could estimate how many watt-hours a lamp or other device would use in any given period. The next step is to figure how much it would cost you to use that device.

If you buy a dozen or a hundred of an article you can usually get a better price than by buying one. Our rates are based on the same principle. We give below our rates for light, heat and power in Baker and La Grande and suggest you cut them out for future reference.

In later Talks we will tell you, why we are able to give cheaper rates for heat and power than for lighting.

Subject to a prompt payment discount of one-half cent per kilowatt hour on first 50, if paid within 10 days after date of billing.

Minimum bill \$1.00 per month, not subject to discount.

Minimum charge \$1.00 per month per horsepower of connected load.

Now consider your 40 Watt (32 candlepower) Mazda lamp on the basis of the rates given above under Schedule "A."

Burning it one hour a day it would use 1x40 or 40 watt-hours, for 30 days this would be 30x40 or 1200 watt-hours or 1.2 K.W.H. (kilowatt Hours); 1.2x10c equals 12c which is the cost of burning this lamp one hour a day for a month. If you are using the old style carbon lamp it takes 100 watts per hour for 32 candlepower which would cost 30 cents to burn it an hour a day for a month. Can you afford to be without Mazda lamps.
