Journalism Will Get Higher Rating

University of Washington, Seattle, Feb. 16.—The faculty has ratified the request of the liberal arts college for raising the standard of the department of journalism. From now on the requirements for admission to the department will be the same as those required by the law school, two years' work in the college of liberal arts. When this goes into effect next September Washington will be the only school of journalism in the country that is not open to freshmen and sophomores. Journalism will still be a four year course, but will be more highly specialized than has been the custom in the past.

Local Pythians Are Entertaining Visitors

Ceremonial This Evening and Luncheon Tomorrow to Be Given for Messrs. Wortman and Gleason.

At 8:30 this evening the Knights of Pythias of La Grande will be hosts to Grand Chancellor Wortman, of Medford, and Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Gleason, of Portland. The lodge dignitaries will be entertained until tomorrow afternoon when the special train leaves at 3 o'clock for Wallowa where the annual convention of the Union-Wallowa counties' district will be held tomorrow.

A luncheon at the Sommer hotel tomorrow noon will be a part of the informal entertainment for the two visitors, and a ceremonial by Khaled Temple, D. O. K. K., this evening will be a further means of entertainment.

The Wallowa train leaves promptly at 8 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. A hundred tickets for supper at Wallowa will be distributed on the train, and special articles of apparel will be given out at the depot to all La Grande knights, Master of Work Perry Oliver and Chancellor Commander McCarthy will introduce a third rank team of 37 to compete for La Grande in the contest to be held at Wallowa tomorrow night. Race teams from Elgin, Enterprise and Wallowa will compete. There is every indication that the total representation from Red Cross No. 27 will be in the neighborhood of 60. The grand-ris tickets cost \$2.40, a fare and a third rate.

Demonstration Wool Car Coming March 2

Experts Will Show Product of Different Counties and Explain to Sheepmen.

Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 16.—(Special to The Observer.)—The demonstration wool car in charge of Messrs. V. O. McWhorton and J. F. Wilson, of the United States bureau of animal industry, and O. M. Nelson, of the Oregon Agricultural college, will be in La Grande on Friday, March 2. The car will contain: a textile exhibit, showing wool in all stages from the raw material to the manufactured fabric; six sheep to demonstrate good and bad fleeces of marketable grade; American market grades under magnifying glass; case of Austrian and New Zealand wool, and samples of wool showing the bad effect of tying the bales with twine, together with fabrics woven from this defective wool.

There will also be books and periodicals on the sheep raising industry and a sheepmen's wheel of fortune to aid the grower in determining the values of different qualities of fleece. The three men in charge of the car are experts along this line of work and are anxious to aid the sheep raiser in any way possible. In addition to the other facilities of the car, it is provided with a set of motion pictures illustrating various phases of the industry.
