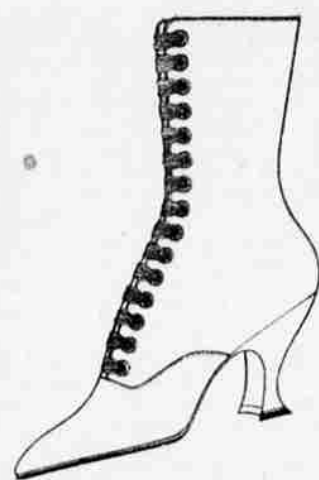

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WASHINGTON'S FAREWELL ADDRESS.

It is proper on George Washington's birthday to ponder on the life of this great American and to re-read his farewell address to the American people. In that address Washington said:

"Observe good faith and justice toward all Nations. Cultivate peace and harmony with all. It will be worthy of a free, enlightened, and, at no distant period, a great nation, to give to mankind the magnanimous and too novel example of a people always guided by an exalted justice and benevolence.

"In the execution of such a plan nothing is more essential than that permanent, inveterate, antipathies against particular nations and passionate attachments for others should be excluded; and that in place of them just and amicable feelings towards all should be cultivated. The Nation which indulges toward another an habitual hatred or an habitual fondness is in some degree a slave. It is a slave to its animosity or to its affection, either of which is sufficient to lead it astray from its duty and its interests.

"The Nation prompted by ill will and resentment sometimes impels to war the government, contrary to the best calculations of policy. The government sometimes par-

ticipates in the national propensity and adopts through passion what reason would reject; at other times, it makes the animosity of the Nation subservient to projects of hostility instigated by pride, ambition, and other sinister or pernicious motives. The peace often, sometimes the liberty of nations, has been the victim.

"So likewise a passionate attachment of one nation for another produces a variety of evils. Sympathy for the favourite nation, facilitating the illusion of an imaginary common interest in cases where none exists, and infusing into one the enmities of the other, betrays the former into participation in the quarrels of the latter, without adequate inducement or justification.

"Against the insidious wiles of foreign influence, I conjure you to believe me, fellow citizens, the jealousy of a free people ought to be constantly awake since history and experience prove that foreign influence is one of the most baneful foes of Republican government.

"The great rule of conduct for us, in regard to foreign nations is, in extending our commercial relations, to have with them as little Political connection as possible. So far as we have already formed engagements let them be fulfilled with perfect good faith. Here let us stop.

"Europe has a set of primary interests, which to us have none, or a very remote relation. Hence she must be engaged in frequent controversies, the causes of which are essentially foreign to our concerns. Hence therefore it must be unwise in us to implicate ourselves by artificial ties in the ordinary vicissitudes of her politics or the ordinary combinations and collisions of her friendships or enmities.

"Our detached and distant situation invites and enables us to pursue a different course.

"Why forgo the advantages of so peculiar a situation? Why quit our own to stand upon foreign ground? Why by interweaving our destiny with that of any part of Europe entangle our peace and prosperity in the toils of European ambition, rivalry, interest, humor or caprice?

"Tis our true policy to steer clear of permanent alliances with any portion of the foreign world.

"Harmony, liberal intercourse with all Nations are recommended by policy, humanity and interest. But even our commercial policy should hold an equal and impartial hand, neither seeking nor granting exclusive favours or preferences. There can be no greater error than to expect or calculate upon real favours from nation to nation.

"The duty of holding a neutral conduct may be inferred, without anything more, from the obligation which justice and humanity impose upon every nation, in cases in which it is free to act, to maintain inviolate the relations of peace and amity toward other nations."
