COLD WEATHER MAY HARM YOUNG LAMBS

Further Unsettled Conditions Are Predicted and Fear Felt for Flocks.

Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 22.—(Special) Unsettled weather conditions, bringing cold and snow, may prove exceedingly severe to the young lambs that are being born this month in Eastern Oregon.

Weather Forecaster Beals of Portland, in a wire this morning to the forest office gave the following prediction: "Unsettled weather with occasional snow at high levels and probably cold rains at low levels, with blustering winds mostly from southerly direction, will prevail during Friday and Saturday."

Yesterday Dan P. Smythe, local sheepman, said that the weather so far had been very good and that, according to the outlook, the percentage of the young stock saved would be higher than ever. There is a probability that a storm, coming at this time, would do considerable damage.

Furthermore, it has served to stop the farmers from doing their early plowing. Many of them were hard at work, taking advantage of the mild days to get their work done at an earlier date than usual.

were bills bringing into conflict the morally progressive and the reactionary forces. There were measures involving conflicts between school directors and school teachers, public service companies and the public, industry and leisure, industry and child welfare, public ownership and private ownership, centralization of authority, and centralization of funds on the one hand and on the other hand division of authority and division of responsibility. There were bills involving a sharp conflict between capital and labor. There were bills which required every member to place himself on record either in favor of popular government and direct legislation or against the initiative and referendum as channels of popular rule. In all these conflicts of principles and conflicts of forces the members of the house and the members of the senate were brought face to face with the eternal warfare between right and wrong and were required to support one side or the other. They were put to the test in their ability to see 'jokers' to understand laws, to understand underlying principles and right and wrong ways of executing them. They were tested in their ability to see the interests and the motives which move human nature to favor or oppose, and every legislator must not only understand but he must choose between sincerity and insincerity and yet be liberal and generous, almost always, toward his opponents.

"There was some politics in the legislature, especially during the last few days. I have been asked to give a talk at the high school in the near future and will go into detail more at that time."

What Some Conductors Do in Spare Time

Decatur, Ill., Feb. 22.—(United Press)—Charles Conklin, Wabash conductor here, is on the last lap of his self imposed task of playing 100,000 games of solitaire. He has about 7000 more games to play and believes he will finish before the end of the year. He began playing in 1897—twenty years ago and has played on an average of 12 games a day since that time. Some days he plays more than a score of sets; others less than the average. In the 93,000 games played thus far, Conklin has beat the "Chink" only 439 times. He won 205 of the first 40,000 played. The highest number of games played between winning hands is 1107. Conklin is unmarried and spends practically every evening at his club over the cards.

The Nourishing Lentil

The nutritive value of the humble lentil should not be overlooked by the housewife who is endeavoring to set a tempting as well as economical table. Lentils contain more protein than the best cuts of meat and in some cases a larger percentage of fat, besides a considerable amount of starch. Their flavor being quite different from that of peas or beans, they make a welcome change as a meat substitute.

Before cooking lentils it is always best to soak them not less than eight hours, though many cooks merely scald them.

Purée of Lentil.

Pick, wash and soak well one-half pint of lentils. Put into a saucepan with two quarts of cold water, a small carrot, one onion, three leeks and a little celery. Set over a slow fire, bring to the boiling point and add a piece of butter the size of an egg. Stir well. Serve very hot with croutons.

Lentil Croquettes.

Soak one cupful of lentils and one-half cupful of red beans; drain and add two cupfuls of water, half an onion, a stalk of celery, a small carrot, sliced, and three sprigs of parsley. Cook until quite soft, then press through a sieve and add one cupful of grated breadcrumbs, one beaten egg, pepper and salt to taste. Make a sauce by creaming two tablespoonfuls of butter and pouring on gradually two-thirds of a cupful of cream; bring to a boil and add lentil mixture. Mix thoroughly, cool, shape, dip in egg and crumbs and fry in deep, hot fat.

German Lentils.

This is a favorite method of preparing them: Cook the lentils in water until they become a pulpy mass. Press them through a sieve and season with butter and salt. They should be of the consistency of mashed potatoes. Just before serving put over them three tablespoonfuls of onions which have already been minced and fried. In many instances pork is preferred to butter in cooking lentils, but either may be used with good results.
