NEW KISSEL KARS ARRIVE AND ARE NOW ON DISPLAY

The new Kissel Kars have arrived and are now on exhibition at the Hilton Garage, where the public is invited to see them. Among them are the Hundred Point Six and the all year car, of which the following is a description:

"Of the Hundred Point Six, the Kissel Motor Car company is extremely and justly proud. Manufactured part by part in the big Kissel plant—not merely assembled—this six is as good throughout as its wonderful Kissel-built engine and axles—an engine without a peer except in cars of much higher list—axles unexcelled in any car at any price.

"Efficiency, stability, power, quiet, comfort, refinement and economy are accomplished in this car to a degree that will satisfy the most discriminating buyer. From its hundred quality features, the car receives its name. "Of these features, many of them exclusive, and all important, the all-year car dominates. Here the two-in-one plan is brought to perfection—to the utmost in beauty, convenience, riding quality, and completeness.

"Yet in neither its summer or winter form is anything of style or luxury sacrificed to accomplish utility. As an open touring car, roadster or Victoria, there is no sign to indicate that it is intended for any other purpose. With sedan, coupe or town top set in—not lapped over as in other types—there are no projecting irons, no crude fastenings, nothing unsightly, at the parting line.

"Nor is this refined exterior mere veneer to conceal a structural make-shift. In fact, the all-year car throughout is designed, constructed and finished as skillfully and carefully as the finest coach. Its convertible feature, while reducing the cost of motoring to those who wish to drive in all seasons, does not do so at the sacrifice of any of the niceties of appearance or comfort.

"The frame and doors of the detachable tops are of heavy selected white ash and elm rigidly joined and cov-

ered with silver finish sheet steel. The roof is three-ply paneled white wood under heavy canvas, laminated. The windows are French plate glass of best quality and are set solidly into hard channel rubber to prevent leaks, draughts and rattles. Standard tops are leather lined, but special linings are furnished at small extra cost.

"The tops are attached to a staunchly-built special body designed to properly support the all-year tops and known as the Kissel Gibraltar. This lower body is built with the tops so that the two halves may exactly dovetail. This special construction accounts largely for the superiority of the all-year car over convertible types manufactured by others.

"The Gibraltar body and top are joined at ten points by means of rectangular bolts and sockets of which nothing remains in sight either outside or inside. A layer of felt and non-squeak material between the lower body and the top eliminates noise. As the halves are attached, spring plungers automatically connect the electric wiring. A dome light supplies the illumination. The switch is thrown by means of a push button.

"Ventilation is obtained through the double windshield and the door windows, the latter adjustable at any height and dropping down into the lower door their full length, if desired.

"All Hundred Point Sixes have divided front seats with a wide corridor between. This single compartment idea was first brought out by Kissel and really was the basis of the all-year plan. The individual seats are adjustable to any reach.

"Instruments are mounted in a straight line on the leather covered cowl, with concealed lights for illuminating them. All wires are centralized on the front of the cowl, therefore quickly accessible and making it easy to remove the body without cutting a wire. The speedometer is driven by shaft from the transmission. "Deep upholstery, resilient cushion
