The Union county teachers' institute Saturday was one of the most instructive and profitable ever held in the county. Over seventy-five teachers were present, which in view of the fact that the attendance was not compulsory, was large. Those present all showed the true professional spirit, the papers were well prepared and delivered, and as a result left an excellent impression. A feature of the institute was a fine dinner served for 25 cents by the domestic science department of the high school under the direction of Miss Kirtley. Mr. Allen of Cove was unable to be present on account of the roads, but the rest of the program was carried out as scheduled.

Mr. McCullough gave an interesting paper on "Agriculture in the Grades." "Grades and Grading" was the topic of Principal Gene W. Hall of North Powder. "The Experimental Store," was described by Miss Janet Jones of La Grande. A solo, "Mamma's Song" (Ware), by Miss Leila Deborah Smith of La Grande was well received. "Function of High School in Relation to Industrial Life of Community" was the interesting topic of Principal A. C. Hampton of La Grande. "School Discipline," was headed by Superintendent E. E. Arant of Union. "That Margin of Time," by Superintendent A. E. Calyson. An instrumental solo, "Novelette by Schumann," was well rendered by Miss Cecile Hindman of La Grande. "Industrial Club Work," was described by Paul Spillman, county agricultural agent.

and is entirely covered by orders. Neither Sawyer-Holmes company nor Child's feed store, the other local dealers, have a pound of coal. Both have plenty of cars ordered but unusual weather conditions on the O. S. L. prohibit even a guess as to when these shipments may be expected.

The O-W. R. & N. company has 3200 tons of coal in eight coaling stations along this division—sufficient to last 48 hours. Nine hundred tons of this coal are in La Grande. The railroad company gets its coal from Wyoming. No shipments are in sight.

To save the coal the railroad company will burn crude oil on the west end, Pilot Rock to Portland, and will keep the coal for hills along the right of way such as at Kamela. At present the company is not provided for oil burning but will take immediate steps to be ready. Crude oil comes from California and there are no weather conditions to impair delivery.

For a week or more La Grande has been skimping along with an ever diminishing coal supply. Telephones into the supply companies have been "hot" with requests for fuel but there has been little the dealers could do except give promises. Until the last day or two these promises were thought to be good but snow storms and slides along the railroads within the past 48 hours have made the promises worth little.

One garage has burned up a small pile of snow-covered slabwood and the casings of shipped automobiles and other odds and ends and is now practically helpless. Dealers say contract customers around the city have not had their contracts filled and that none of the larger buildings which use coal are supplied.

One dealer paid a bonus to receive a carload of Utah lump coal and added a dollar a ton to the price, selling at \$11.50 a ton.

The railroad had promised one carload of coal to J. D. Lynch today but it had not arrived at noon.
