Fred Haisten Writes He Is Much Better

Tells Friend Thorough Tubercular Test Shows No Symptoms—He Can Not Live Here.

In a letter received this week by E. Polack from Fred D. Haisten, the writer says he is gaining flesh and that a thorough tubercular test showed him free from the disease. However his physician, Dr. Molitor, says Mr. Haisten cannot live in high altitudes because of his bronchial affliction but that he may visit in La Grande June, July and August of this year. Mr. Haisten will probably come for those months.

The letter follows:
San Diego, Cal., Feb. 20, 1917.—Mr. E. Polack, La Grande, Ore. Dear Friend Polack—I certainly was surprised and pleased to receive your letter, forwarded here. I tell you, such remembrances as this one makes good will worth while. Glad I am to read one. Yes, I am gaining.

I am glad to tell all my friends there, that a most severe test has proven no tubercular infection whatever, but the bronchial trouble still remains. Dr. Molitor tells me I can not live in high altitudes, cold countries nor along the seashore.

This is a beautiful city, and a lovely climate—far better than La Grande but Dr. Molitor sent me away, and immediately I returned, I felt the difference. He refuses sanction for me to return home before June and then to leave by September 1. He does not give me medicine, says only climate is my sole resource, and I found that only on the desert waste of Arizona, far away from the irrigated districts. My program is not completed yet, but it is now likely that I will return to Arizona.

Tell the boys I appreciate their good will and remembrance and hope to have an interesting story to tell when I return. With very warm regards to Mrs. Polack and yourself, I am,

Mr. Kiddle said:
"Our chairman requested me to make a few remarks on some economic question and cautioned me not to make my talk too long.

"It is an old saying that if you want advice about raising a family go to an old maid; if advice is wanted about merchandising, go to a farmer, and if advice is desired about farming, go to a merchant, because as a rule the less a person knows about a subject the more they will talk.

"As this is a mixed audience composed of preachers, merchants, postmasters, newspapermen, millers and some honest men, I will endeavor to talk a few moments on a subject which I think will strike all of you. And as a minister would say, "My text will be preparedness." Preparedness is a text that will cover a "multitude of sins" as well as numerous virtues.

"I am firmly of the belief that the main cause of the terrible carnage across the sea was brought on by too much preparedness.

"The minister has to prepare his sermons that he will be enabled to assist us in our preparedness for the great hereafter.

"The editor has to prepare his copy, and the typesetter has to prepare his type to enable us to get the benefit of all the latest news in the shortest possible time.

"And so on in all lines of trade, we find preparedness is the main wheel or factor in our success in life and business.

"And now I want to talk a little on a preparedness subject that we are all deeply interested in. It being that of good roads. And please take notice that I am placing the emphasis on the good.

"In the early period of the settlement of our state, we simply spoke of ROADS, but now I think I am safe in saying that 90 per cent of the people are anxious to see that emphasis is put on the GOOD, as we all realize how much it means to us to have a GOOD road in comparison to simply

having a road to travel over.
"The session of the legislature just closed passed numerous road bills; the most prominent of which are House Bill 21, House Bill 509 and House Bill 550.

"House Bill 509 is quite an extensive bill, mainly regarding automobiles. The principal feature of the bill is a new schedule of license tax. It is as follows:

HOUSE BILL 509

Tax on motorcycles and automobiles as follows:

Motorcycles \$ 3.00

Automobiles:

Electric, pleasure 6.00

Electric, service 10.00

Steam or gas up to 26 h.p. 6.00

Steam or gas 26 to 36 h.p. 10.00

Steam or gas 36 to 40 h.p. 15.00

Steam or gas 40 up 20.00

Motor trucks:

1 1-2 tons to 2 tons 15.00

2 tons to 2 1-2 tons 18.00

2 1-2 tons to 3 tons 21.00

3 tons to 3 1-2 tons 24.00

3 1-2 tons to 4 tons 27.00

4 tons to 5 tons 30.00

"Any motor truck over five tons capacity must have a permit from the county clerk to run on the highway. Said permit to cost \$8 per month.

"House Bill 21 is called the 'Beaumont bill' and provides for a bond issue of as much as may be necessary up to \$1,180,310.44, Post Roads; \$638,970, Forest Road; total of \$1,819,280.55.

"This money to be expended with a

like amount from U. S. treasury in constructing and maintaining post and forest roads.

"This bill provides that the automobile license money and 1-4 mill state tax shall be used, as far as these amounts will go. The balance is to be raised by bonds.

"House Bill No. 550 is the bill known as the \$6,000,000 'Paving Bond Bill' and as the title suggests is a bill authorizing an issue of bonds to the amount of \$6,000,000.

"Said bonds are to be issued as needed during next five years bearing 4 per cent interest. Said bonds are to be payable in 20 annual installments commencing with the sixth year. Interest is payable semi-annually.

The bonds and interest to be paid from the automobile license and 1-4 mill road tax fund.

"Now, this bond bill is not what we would have liked to have had, but we were like the story of the girl with the small apple.

"It was taken this bill or none and I believe, that by taking the short end of the string for awhile, we will eventually come into our own.

"Under this Bill Portland or Multnomah County does not get any assistance BUT there are five of the proposed paved roads leading to Portland and connecting with roads which they already have paved. This will give them about 350 miles of paved roads in radius of 75 miles of their city."

ful. He lacked that "spiritual discernment" and duty to "search the scriptures that he might find therein eternal life"—fitting him for the task of understanding and appreciating the Apostle's earnest declarations.
