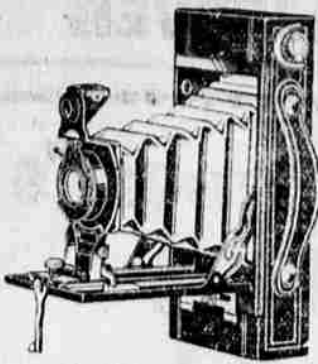

Wool Car Attracts Visitors Entire Day

School Children and Sheepmen Alternate in Thrilling Exhibit—Guides Explain Processes and Make Suggestions.

The federal, agricultural college and O-W. wool exhibit car here today has been visited the entire day by Union county citizens. School children of the city saw the exhibit this morning and heard short talks by the men in charge, J. F. Wilson, assistant in wool investigation of the bureau of animal industry, Cran M. Nelson, sheep specialist of the Oregon Agricultural college, and D. E. Clark, livestock agent of the O-W. R. and N. company. Sheepmen and business men in groups were led through the car and the exhibits thoroughly explained and discussed.

The object of the car is to teach the wool grower the value of a working knowledge of the market grades of wool, and to demonstrate the benefits to be obtained through better methods of preparation of wool for the market.

The special features of the car are: Six sheep to show the market grades of wool; a textile exhibit showing all the stages in the manufacture of cloth; samples of Australian and New Zealand wools; American market grades of wool under magnifying glasses; pictures of shearing sheds, dealers warehouses, textile mills, range scenes, breed of sheep, etc., samples of cloth showing the effects of using sisal twine for tying fleeces, and of using too much paint in branding; suggestions for the sheepman's library; bales of wool put up under the old and new systems; "The Sheepmen's Wheel of Fortune" for calculating grease value of wools when the shrinkage is known; exhibition fleeces of different values, and a model of an Australian shearing shed.

Circuit Court Notes

Today is motion day in the circuit court.

A decree of divorce was granted W. D. Grandy yesterday from Flora M. Grandy. Complaint states property age action against J. K. Wright and the La Grande Investment company rights were settled out of court.

Milton E. Pomeroy has filed damper alleged negligence in the operation of an automobile arising out of the circumstances in which Mr. Pomeroy was injured last fall when the bicycle he was riding and the machine in which Mr. Wright was driving collided at the intersection of Sixth street and O avenue in La Grande.

Another round in the Fourth street assessment litigation was enacted in the circuit court this morning when the case of Wagoner and other Fourth street owners against La Grande was heard on some preliminary.

A writ of review has been petitioned for and allowed from the judgment of the city court at Union wherein a citizen of Union was convicted and fined \$10 for playing a game of cards in a public place. His petition for review claims Union had no authority to pass such an ordinance and if it did the creation of such an offense was outside the range of municipal legislation. The case will come before Judge Knowles in the near future.
