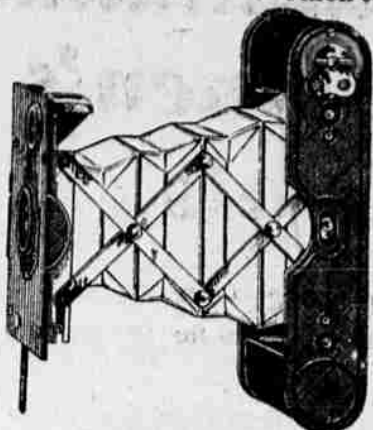

Erick Nielsen Was Resident of This City 16 Years—Elmer E. Nielsen Is Son.

Erick Nielsen, 65, a violinist, of La Grande, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Tiffany, in Newman, Cal., February 26. He was a native of Denmark and came to this country when a small boy. He first lived at Spanish Fork, Utah, and with his family came to La Grande 16 years ago. He is survived by the widow, three sons and two daughters: James A. Nielsen of Spanish Fork, Utah; John E. Nielsen of The Dalles; Mrs. George Manville of Idaho; Mrs. Frank Tiffany of Newman, Cal.; and Elmer E. Nielsen of La Grande. A brother and sister also survive Mr. Nielsen. The remains were shipped from Newman to Spanish Fork, Utah, for burial.

Imbler Hogs Bring \$12.85. What is believed to be the highest priced load of hogs to ever cross the scales on the Portland market was sold Monday. The hogs were shipped by B. E. Stack, of Imbler, Oregon. They were of the Duroc breed and were a result of Mr. Stack's own breeding and feeding. There were 99 head in the shipment, averaging 213 pounds and sold for \$12.85, or a net price of \$2711.35.
