Lott Fillmore Funeral Here Monday

Dead Man Was Imbler Pioneer and Member of G. A. R.—Luman Fillmore of La Grande Is Son.

Lott Fillmore, a pioneer of Imbler and a well known G. A. R. man, died Thursday in Imbler at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ella Keown. Mr. Fillmore was born in Potter Brook, Pennsylvania, September 20, 1839. He enlisted in Pennsylvania company D, 136th regiment in 1862 and received his honorable discharge May 29, 1863. He was a member of the Abe Lincoln Post No. 4, G. A. R., at Walla Walla. He is survived by the widow, two children, Luman Lawrence Fillmore of La Grande and Ella M. Keown of Imbler, and a brother, Perry Fillmore of Mica, Washington. The body is at Henry's chapel and the funeral will be held Monday at 2 p. m. The La Grande G. A. R. has charge of the services and they desire all who are able to be present.
