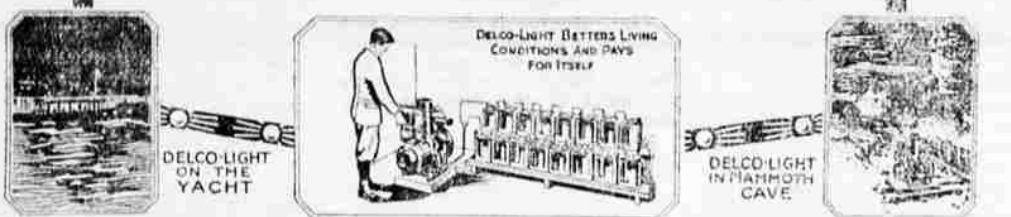

**SENDS HUSBY TO COLLEGE
TO LEARN TO EARN MORE
THAN SHE IS EARNING**

San Francisco, March 6.—(United Press)—Mrs. Esther Bercovitz Kehoe is sending her husband to college today because she believes in business efficiency. She is a designer for a tailoring company.

If a woman discovers she can earn more than her husband, says Mrs. Kehoe, the husband should be educated to such an extent that his earning ability is equal to that of his wife. And while hubby is getting this education, wife should support the family, she believes.

"I see nothing out of the ordinary in our arrangement," she said today. "The situation was this: 'I was getting a better salary than my husband. So we thought it best that he should go to college and increase his efficiency. While he is doing this, the husband should look after the housework. My husband gets home from school early and prepares dinner. He is learning to be an expert chemist, and in a short time will be able to command a good salary."

"The trouble with most American women is that they don't look at matters in a practical, business-like way. With European women, and I am one, it is different. I learned my lesson in Roumania. When I was a child I found it necessary to make my way, but in Roumania a woman cannot earn her own living. So my brother and I went to Paris, where I learned designing."

W. S. C. Basketball
Champs To Compete
In National Games

Coach Fred Bohler and Six Players Will Make Trip This Month to Chicago—Team Is Best in Northwest and Broke Even With U. of C. Five.

Spokane, Wash., March 6.—The Washington State college basketball team, champions of the northwest conference and probable title holders in the Pacific coast conference, will compete in the National Amateur Athletic union championship tournament in Chicago this month for the premier honors of the United States for 1916-17. An invitation from the A. A. U. to take part in the Chicago tournament has been acted upon favorably by the athletic council of the college located at Pullman. According to the plans Coach Fred Bohler and six players will be sent to the tournament. The dates for the annual championship have been set for March 15, 16 and 17, and the northwest's best team will be sent to Chicago in time to get some practice on the Central Y. M. C. A. floor, where the tournament will be staged, to accustom the players to the angles of the playing court. The W. S. C. team suffered but one defeat during the season. California won a game from the state college quintet in Berkeley, but Washington evened up by taking the second game of the series from the U. of C. Five. There is no chance to figure W. S. C. out for less than a tie with California for the Pacific coast conference title, and if the honor is awarded on a basis of games won and lost Washington State will get the title as it has completed in many more college games than California.

"SAVE THE BABIES"

These are authentic quotations from the pamphlet on babies by Dr. L. Emmett Holt of Columbia and Dr. Henry L. K. Shaw of Union university.

At 12 months the baby should be weaned from the bottle and taught to drink milk from a cup. Four cups daily. He may also have cereals twice a day. They should be thoroughly cooked and strained.
