PHILLIES LACK THE PUNCH THEY HAVE CONSISTENTLY CARRIED IN PAST SEASONS
Philadelphia, March 6.—(United Press)—The star of the Phillies seems to have set just as Grover Cleveland Alexander attained the height of his efforts. Critics are not placing them any better than third, with small chance that they will be that good. The punch that has featured former Philadelphia National league clubs, the superb pitching of Alexander, and excellent fielding will not be noted in such strong quantities this year as formerly. Alexander cannot win a pennant unaided, nor can he hold his team in a first division berth. Unless some pitcher can be developed to help the Nebraska wonder Philadelphia cannot hope to make much of a bid for a pennant. Rixey isn't capable—at least he never has shown that he is so much of a good man today and a poor one tomorrow. The aid of Al Damaree, Giant chaser, will be missing this year, and Jimmy Lavender is scarcely capable of doing much. Erskine Mayer probably will cut small figure. Joe Oeschger is the logical man to save the Phillies. If he can combine some good hurling with the wonderful efforts of Alexander the Phillies will have some chance. There will be no change in the Phillies this season. Fred Luderus, a good, steady, smart ball player will be at first base. He is a hard hitter, an excellent fielder, and an aggressive man at every stage. There are few first basemen better than he. Bert Niehoff, never considered better than just mediocre, will be at second base in all probability. Bancroft, a real star, has no serious opposition at shortstop and he doubtless will be found there again. Milton Stock, a good third sacker, will be on that station. The infield is just good—no better. There are plenty of infields just as good and several that are better. No more can be said of the outfield. Whitted is a remarkable ball player, but his indifference has hurt his playing. He is not a whole outfield, nor is he a Ty Cobb. Dode Paskert's worth is gradually declining. Goode or Cooper probably will be found in the other garden. The worth of the pitching staff is summed up in the foregoing estimates. Alexander can do wonders if he has help. The catching staff is splendid. Bill Killefer and Burns or Adams forms a staff that would be welcome in any National league club.
Spokane College Men Ask To Serve Nation
Spokane, Wash., March 6.—More than a score of Spokane college men, members of the University club, have signified their intention of applying for membership in the officers' reserve corps of the United States army. Applications will be sent at once to western headquarters of the army at San Francisco and classes will be held, under the direction of an army officer, to prepare for the examinations which are expected to be given soon at Fort George Wright in Spokane. It is expected that the applicants who volunteer their services to act as army officers at once, as well as several others who are contemplating the same step, will be commissioned in time to take the fortnight's training for reserve officers which probably will be given next summer at American Lake. In case of war the reserve officers would be called to the colors, to take charge of volunteer units that would be called into existence. They would at least retain their rank, with the probability that they would be given higher commissions.

SENATOR O'GORMAN, LAST OF SILK HAT STATESMEN, RETIRES FROM PUBLIC LIFE
Washington, March 6.—(United Press)—United States Senator O'Gorman of New York, the last of the silk hat statesmen of the old order, closed his public career when the senate adjourned Sunday. "I have completed an uninterrupted public service of 24 years," said the senator today, "18 years as judge and 6 years as senator; and I must now give attention to my private affairs." Senator O'Gorman was the only influential Tammany leader who supported Woodrow Wilson for the presidency from the first. In the early days of Wilson's first administration he was very close to the president and regarded as his personal spokesman on both sides of the capitol. Political differences later over the appointment of the senator's son-in-law, Dudley Field Malone, as collector of the Port of New York, caused O'Gorman to be less popular with the administration. Secretary McAdoo, President Wilson's son-in-law, wanted Frank Polk, now assistant secretary of state, appointed to the place.
