Charities and Correction Conference to Deal With Misery

Chicago, March 6.—(United Press)—The abolition of human misery will be the keynote of the annual national Conference of Charities & Correction at Pittsburgh, June 6 to 13.

Unfair food prices, neglected children, slum districts, criminal classes, insane, mental defectives and immoral conditions in out of the way rural districts will be dealt with and plans outlined for the elimination of them from national life.

President Frederick Almy of Buffalo will talk about "The Abolition of Poverty." Other speakers will be Thomas Mott Osborne, Wilfred S. Reynolds of Chicago, Robert A. Woods of Boston, Edward T. Devine and Morris Hillquit of New York, who will speak on social insurance; Dr. Owen Copp of Philadelphia.

Thirty-five hundred social workers are expected to attend the conference from all parts of the United States.

Lodge Introduces Armed Ship Bill. Washington, March 7.—(United Press)—Senator Lodge yesterday attempted to introduce the armed neutrality bill in the Senate. The measure is identical with the previous bill. Owen moved bills for introduction were not in order as foreign relations committee expired Sunday.

LANE'S ACTION DEcriED. Throughout Oregon the action of Senator Harry Lane in standing with the filibustering senators who opposed the armed neutrality bill and "talked it to death" in the closing hours of the Sixty-Fourth Congress, is decried. The press of the state denounces him. The Portland Telegram last night says the question of recalling Lane is being considered, and if the recall is applicable to a United States senator, further says that it will be launched against him.

Reminiscence of Harvey Scott

(By Jabez Nelson) A long, long time ago, before the typewriter and linotype had invaded the newspaper office, I was telegraph editor of the Portland Oregonian, and Harvey Scott was editor-in-chief. Scott indited his editorials with a short, soft pencil on the ordinary scratch paper still generally used in newspaper offices. He wrote a characteristic hand that was perfectly legible to those familiar with it, but which embarrassed some printers, so they exchanged their "takes" of Scott's copy for other matter. Other printers preferred Scott's manuscript, for the joy of reading it and thinking about the ideas in it.

Scott was not a stickler for revised proofs, and as the proofreader was extremely careful about the editorials, few errors got into the paper. Still there was the instance where the Shakespearean line, "'Tis true, 'tis pity, and pity, 'tis' Lat one night the proofreader found, in a Scott editorial, the line "Under which king, Bezonian? Speak or die," in which Scott had inadvertently written "Benzonian." The proofreader came downstairs in some distress and asked what the line meant. Most of the members of the staff didn't know exactly, but thought it would be sacrilege to change a letter. I stood out against all the other; said the line was good Shakespeare, and needed only the change of one letter, so as to read "Bezonian." I convinced the proofreader I was right, and next day he commended me to Mr. Scott, who told me about the line, which is from "Henry the Fourth." It was quoted in ridicule from a bombastic play of Shakespeare's time, long since forgotten. Shakespeare put in into the mouth of Pistol, a servant of Falstaff.

After this incident I found I had acquired an entirely fictitious reputation as a student of Shakespeare, and I was obliged to read the works of the master in order to hold up my end of the conversations when Scott would begin to discuss some Shakespearean point with me.
