JACK O'NEILL MATCHED WITH CHAMPION BERG

LOCAL MAN'S OPPONENT HAS AN INTERNATIONAL REPUTATION.

CONTEST TO BE STAGED IN LA GRANDE MARCH 23

Match Signed Under Catch as Catch Can Rules, Finish Contest, Winner to Take All—Large Purse Is Offered—Both Men Have Met Such Men as Gotch, "Farmer" Burns, Demetral, Pons and Others.

John Berg, 175-pound wrestling champion, will defend his title here against the local favorite, Jack O'Neill, March 23, in a finish match for a large purse, best two falls in three. The winner will take entire purse.

John Berg has wrestled over a thousand bouts. He is 29 years old and

began his professional career as a strong man which gave him a wonderful insight into human anatomy. As a strong man he established a record then of lifting 575 pounds with either hand. This feat has not been duplicated by any man his weight.

Berg discarded the strong man stunt and turned professional wrestler. He has wrestled all the good heavyweights in the United States and Europe. It took Gotch two hours and 11 minutes to throw him the first fall; Berg getting one fall out of the three in 11 minutes. This match was held in Kansas City a few years ago. Berg won from Rooney, the "Giant Gripman," in New Orleans. He beat Dan McLeod, Carl Pons, the big Frenchman, William J. Demetral, the Greek, and hundreds of other good men in this country and Europe.

Jack O'Neill needs no introduction to the local fans. He has wrestled many of the same men who have met Berg, among them, Gotch, McLeod, "Farmer" Burns, Ordman and others in the heavyweight class. He has a long string of victories.

O'Neill now claims the light heavyweight championship of the coast and is willing to defend his claim against the best men in this class.

Berg and O'Neill have never met although negotiations for a match have been made before but for some reason were never consummated.

The match March 23 will be a finish contest under catch-as-catch can rules.
