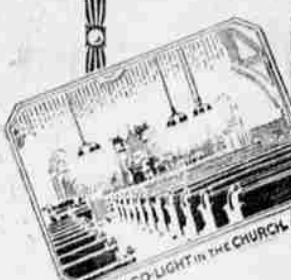
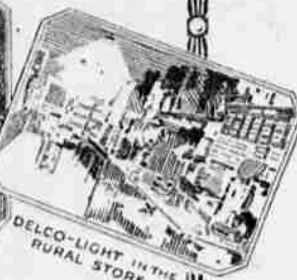

Washington, March 7.—(United Press)—The supreme court has ordered the German prize steamer Appan restored to its British owners. The court dismissed Werner Horn's appeal and ordered the alleged German plotter to stand trial on the charge of conspiring to dynamite the Canadian railway bridge. The court declared the Washington, New York and Iowa workmen's compensation laws valid.

Big Creameries Merged.

Portland, March 7.—(Special)—The two largest creameries in the state, which controls more than 50 per cent of all the milk, cream, butter and cheese business of Portland, have been merged into one concern. They were the Portland Pure Milk & Cream company and the Damascus Creamery company. The new concern is called the Portland-Damascus Milk company and its capital stock is fixed at \$225,000.

American Tells British That The U. S. Navy is Pro-Ally

London, Feb. 10.—(United Press by Mail)—The British public was told today that the United States navy is pro-ally. As authority for this statement, the London Morning Post publishes a letter from W. H. Stayton, executive secretary of the United States Navy league, which accompanied a friendly message from the directors of that body to the British Navy league.

"I hope," writes Mr. Stayton, "you will notice that in our December issue of 'Sea Power' we asked for aid for the British orphans of the Jutland fight. Of course, some of our Teutonic fellow-citizens have shrieked at our lack of neutrality, but we have

had the pleasure of sending to his Royal Highness Prince Louis of Battenburg a sum collected from many people.

"There are times when we feel that the sayings and doings of our administration may mislead you as to the sentiments of our people. In our central and western states, there are undoubtedly pro-Germans, but through the course of the war I have personally heard only one man express a view favorable to the Huns. The great body of our people, and especially all connected with the navy, know that you are fighting the battle of liberty and civilization, and that we are playing a none too worthy part."
