BOSTON BRAVES WILL HAVE A STRONG COMBINATION THIS YEAR

Boston, March 7.—(United Press)—The same sterling pitching staff, the same energetic infield, and the same snappy, punchy out-field, probably will be seen in action for the Braves again this year. There are certain to be a few changes, but for the most part the Braves will be just as they finished a year ago. Such a solidity of purpose, a bulwark of defense, and an angle of attack have been developed that to tear away part of the machine would be to damage it badly, in the opinion of George Stallings. He made a game fight a year ago and he figures he will be able to deliver the same punch again this year.

The catching staff again will depend upon Hank Gowdy, the backstop who played with such amazing skill during the world's series of 1915. He will have as assistants Blackburn, a good youngster, and Tragger. Rice will be given a tryout, but is not expected to horn in ahead of the others.

Stallings remarked a short time ago that he has heard from Bill James and that the pitching star believes he can get his arm into shape for a season this summer. James was useless in the last campaign, but was kept on in the hope that he would develop something. So far it has been a hope, but he will be given plenty of time to get in shape this spring.

Dick Rudolph, Nehf, Hughes, Ragán, Tyler and Davis are expected to hold up most of the pitching. This staff is plenty for most any club. Stallings, in fact, is rated by many to be in a position to give the Giants a stronger battle for the pennant than any manager in the league.

Collins, Magee, and Wilhoit, the out-

field which did the heavy work last year, seems to have the call, but Joe Kelly, obtained from Chicago in the trade which sent Fred Mitchell to that city, a promising man has been added. Kelly has had major league experience. He will have to show the goods if he sticks. Larry Chappelle also will get another major league trial.

The infield will be composed of Konechy, Evers, Maranville and Smith, a combination which never has failed to acquit itself with credit.

The Braves now are in Miami, Fla., preparing for the season in their costly plant. They will meet the Athletics in a series of three games at Miami, beginning March 22.

MOTOR HORSE TRAVELS FAST ON SNOW OR ICE

When a North Dakota inventor hitches up his "Motor horse," described in the March Popular Mechanic Magazine, he enjoys a sensation altogether unusual. It was first driven about the streets of Grand Forks and consists essentially of a motor wheel pivoted between a pair of sleigh runners, the rim of the wheel being equipped with studs, or spikes, which furnish rapid traction on either snow or ice. The driver may stand on skis or be seated on a sled or toboggan from 12 or 15 ft. behind the "horse," being drawn along by two ropes, while other lines serve for starting, stopping, steering, and regulating the speed. The complete machine weighs 51 lbs. A special gasoline motor is built within and geared directly to the driving wheel. At one time a distance of 103 miles through deep snow was covered in 3 hr. 12 min. with the driver on skis. Under more favorable conditions much greater speeds have been attained.

Eighteen Creeds in One Church

A federated church, in which eighteen denominations are worshipping harmoniously, seems to be solving the small town problem in Atascadero, San Luis Obispo County, California. In other places a federated church means the uniting of bodies already organized, while here the plan came in response to the popular wish of the people that there be, from the beginning, but one church. Atascadero it should be said, is a colony, ten miles long and seven miles wide, founded a few years ago by Mr. E. G. Lewis.

The church was organized in July, 1915, by the pastor, Dr. Edward A. Berry, a brother of Bishop F. Berry of the Methodist Church. Dr. Berry made a systematic canvass of the colonists and found but one who opposed the idea. When the book of the church was opened for signatures, 120 members were enrolled. In less than a year the membership went to 250.

The following denominations are represented: Baptist, Congregational, Episcopal, Evangelical Association, Freewill Baptist, Friends, Disciples of Christ, Lutheran, Methodist Episcopal, Methodist Episcopal South, Presbyterian, Presbyterian South, United, United Brethren, Universalist, Unitarian, Spiritualist, Roman Catholic.

The benevolences of the church are all directed toward helping the needy in the lands suffering from war.—The Christian Herald.
