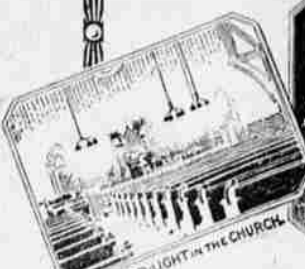

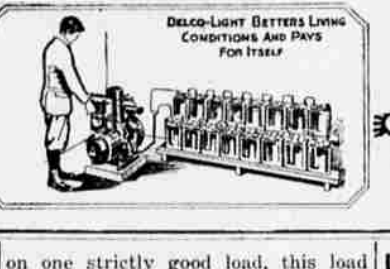

Ad Men To Hold World's Convention

Ten Thousand Are Expected to Attend Chicago Meeting.

St. Louis, March 7.—(United Press)—Ten thousand advertising men at the national convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the world here in June will outline plans not only to promote, but to compel absolute honesty in advertising, both among newspapers and advertisers themselves in the United States.

The groundwork, the advertising men feel, has been laid by their several year's campaign advocating honesty in advertising. A number of newspapers have inaugurated honest advertising campaigns and much progress, the organization feels, has been made. Now the plan will be to go out and actively fight dishonest advertising on a national basis.

The club's national vigilance committee has done a lot of this work already, but this will be increased and developed, the committee forming the basis for the national campaign for honesty in advertising.

PORTLAND MARKETS

Portland, March 8.—There was a liberal supply of cattle received last Monday, over 1400 head which was quite a surprise to the trade. The market was rather slow at the opening large killers not being in the early trade, although after they had their orders the market turned active and prices were all on a steady basis with last week. The top on beef steers was 5 cents higher than a week ago.

on one strictly good load, this load brought \$9.85 with another load at \$9.80. There was a good spread of steers that brought \$9.35 to \$9.75. Good light 1000-lb. feeding steers were in excellent demand again and a number of loads went at \$8.75 and \$8.85. A number of sales of medium beef steers were made at \$8.25 to \$8.60 which made up the day's trade. The quality of the run was very good. One prime load of cows sold at \$8.15 with a number of small lots of good cows from \$7.50 to \$8. A load of cows that carried very little fat brought \$7.25 while dairy cows sold from \$5 to \$6.75. Bulls were in good supply with a good demand. Best heavy bulls went at \$7 and \$7.25 with the bulk of the good hogs bringing \$6.50 to \$6.75.

Hogs.

Hogs made a further advance of 50 cents yesterday. There was a light supply barely enough to let each buyer get on a pen. One load sold at \$13.50 while the bulk of the sales were made at \$13.25 and \$13.35. Pigs were in good supply with an excellent call. Best pigs brought \$12.25 with the bulk of the bids at \$12. Feeders sold mostly at \$11.50.

Sheep.

Sheep and lamb prices made further advances yesterday. There was a liberal supply on the market with a good demand. Best lambs sold readily at \$12.90 to \$13.10 while yearlings brought \$10 for several decks, while several loads of good ewes sold at \$9.75.

Hopes To Have Cure For Infant Paralysis

Dr. Maximilian Herzog Expects to Perfect Remedy Before Fatal Hot Summer Months.

Chicago, March 8.—(United Press)—Dr. Maximilian Herzog expects to have perfected a sure cure for infantile paralysis before the fatal hot summer months, he announced today. "Already," said Dr. Herzog, who has made an exhaustive study of the cause, prevention and cure of the disease which caused so many deaths and so much distress last summer, "the microbe which causes infantile paralysis has been definitely isolated and experiments are being made to locate an antitoxin which effectively stamps out the disease among sheep and cattle."

"We hope to have perfected an effective antitoxin for human beings by summer."

The Chicago health authorities have enlisted prominent physicians, bacteriologists, nurses, women's clubs and civic organizations in a concerted effort to check the disease before it gets a start in Chicago this year.

Girls In Alsace Are Happy Welcoming French Soldiers

Communion Veils Hidden Away Years Ago Are Worn Again—Alsacian Girls and French Soldiers Are Being Wedded At Civil and Religious Ceremonies

With the French Armies, Thann, Alsace, Feb. 2.—(By Mail)—Just about the happiest girls in the world today are the girls of Alsace, who, years ago, following their first communion, secretly hid away their white communion veils to be worn again in welcoming the French troops back to Alsace—should that happy event ever come.

Today, these girls in that portion of Alsace which has been re-occupied by the French, are supremely happy, because they are girls whose dreams have come true.

Some of the younger ones had only a few years in which to dream and to wait, but amongst the long lines of white robed and white veiled girls and women, who welcomed the French troops on their arrival at Thann in August, 1914, there were some who had cherished their communion veils for over forty years.

And now that this happy dream has come true, the white communion veils are again being laid away for another happy dream that promise not to be so long in coming. This is the marriage between Alsacian girls and the French soldiers who have redeemed their province for France, and already in the town of Thann alone four of these marriages have taken place, when white veils, worn at the first communion, then to welcome the French soldiers back to Alsace, were finally worn for the third and last time at the marriage ceremony which symbolized anew the union of France and Alsace.

The brides in these happy events had the additional pleasure of having the civil marriage ceremony performed by a gallant French captain, who having lost his right arm in the fighting to redeem Thann, now serves as the French military mayor, whilst the religious ceremony was performed by French priests who came in the wake of the French army.

Saturday Is Orange Day; Merchants Ready

There are more California oranges in La Grande today than ever before in history. Immense shipments by fast freight have been coming in for the past week to supply the big demand by local merchants in preparation for National Orange Day which, this year, falls on Saturday, March 10. Fruit dealers say that there will be more oranges bought and eaten during the next few days than during any similar period preceding the Orange days of past years.

Reports from California indicate that the same condition is true throughout the country. This great annual fruit festival nationally inaugurated a few years ago has grown to such proportions that in the California groves, professional orange picking gangs have been kept tremendously busy for the past week taking the fruit from the trees fast enough to supply all markets. Trainload after trainload has left the Golden state already, and they are still coming.

A child 2 to 3 years old should have for breakfast: The juice of one sweet orange, or the pulp of 4 or 5 stewed prunes, or applesauce. Either a well cooked cereal, cornmeal, Pettijohn, oatmeal, cracked wheat, wheatena, all well salted and not more than one-half teaspoonful of sugar, and milk added. Or a soft boiled or poached egg with stale bread or crisp toast. Also a glass of warmed milk. Give him a glass of warmed milk at 10:30 also.
