IN FAIRNESS TO SENATOR LANE.

Senator Lane is coming in for severe denunciation, as he deserves in view of his action Saturday night. It is well to let him know that with reference to foreign affairs the people of Oregon expect him to uphold the hands of the president, come what may.

Yet some of the attacks on Senator Lane are so rabid as to be ridiculous and uncalled for. The Senator did wrong and the East Oregonian is free to say so, regardless of the fact he was supported for election by this paper. But the Senator is not a "pusillanimous coward" or a "traitor." His judgment may be questioned but his patriotism cannot be doubted. The Senator is eccentric and on Saturday night he was eccentric at a very inopportune time but that is no reason for impugning his courage or his loyalty to the government.

The problem of immediate importance is not what the Senate has already done but what it is going to do towards the abolition of filibustering. In this connection Senator Lane's conduct is all that could be desired. He has announced his purpose of supporting a cloture rule so as to prevent senatorial brigandage in the future.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

United States: Estimated stocks on farms March 1 this year, 32,800,000 bushels, compared with 58,301,000 bushels a year ago and 42,889,000 bushels two years ago. Price March 1 to producers, 96.9 cents per bushel, compared with 59.6 cents per bushel a year ago and 67.7 cents per bushel two years ago.
