## COVE NEWS NOTES

Mrs. Betsy Severs Buried Monday—J. S. Houx Celebrates 83rd Birthday—Daughter Born to Mr. and Mrs. Lester Johnson—Newspaper Assured Cove.

Cove, Oregon, Mar. 10.—(Special)—Mrs. Betsy Borson Severs, who died very suddenly with heart failure Friday, March 2, 1917, at the age of 64 years, was born in Bergen, Norway, December 13, 1852.

She emigrated to America with her parents in 1887 at the age of 15 years. They located in Cambridge, Wis., moving from there to Augusta, Wis., in 1875, where she married O. T. Severs at the age of 23 years. The young people made their home in Forest City, Iowa, where they resided for several years, removing from there to Thompson, Iowa, where they lived until 1901, when they moved to Cove, Oregon, with their three unmarried children. Previously they had lost two little girls at the ages of two and one-half and nine years. These children were buried at Thompson, Iowa.

Mrs. Severs was an active member of the Methodist church, and a member of the Ladies' Aid Society and the Woman's Improvement club of Cove. Her cheerfulness and kindly influence were an inspiration to all who knew her and her bereaved ones have the heartfelt sympathy of the community. Besides her husband Mrs. Severs is survived by five children: Rankin W. Severs, Naches, Washington; Mrs. J. D. Stout, Auburn, Washington; Mrs. John Dean, Cove, N. Y.; Miss Florence Severs, New York, N. Y.; Miss Bonnie Severs, Cove.

All were present at the funeral excepting Miss Florence who is in New York City, attending school. Parker Severs and Imogene Stout, grandchildren; and one brother residing in Texas; and three sisters living in Euclair, Wis., also survive her.

The funeral services were held at the home Monday, March 5, 1917, at 1:30 p. m. Rev. Chas. Powell of the Episcopal church and Rev. Dr. C. C. Pratt of the Methodist church, conducted the services. Interment at the Cove cemetery.
