Union News Notes

Union Pioneer Passes Away

Union, Ore., Mar. 12—(Special)—John W. Reeves, a pioneer and one of the members remaining of the Preston G. A. R. of this city was buried here today. Mr. Reeves was born in Brown county, Illinois, June 18, 1842 and died at Hot Lake Sanatorium, March 10, 1917, aged 75 years seven

months 22 days. From Illinois Mr. Reeves emigrated to Missouri when but a lad. He was married August 3, 1816 to Miss Lydia A. Dorman and to this union five children were born: W. W. Reeves of Montana, John J. Reeves, Mrs. Catherine Cameron, and Miss Hannah Reeves of Union, Oregon and Lillie L. Reeves, who died April 2, 1896. His wife passed away September 10, 1907. August 22, 1862 Mr. Reeves en-

listed as a soldier and served two years and eight months in the Union Army.

Mr. Reeves came to La Grande Ronde valley in 1881. He has been an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church for the past 20 years.

The funeral services were conducted at the M. E. church by the pastor, Rev. Homer E. Cullison. Union, Ore., March 13—The Oregon Scout says:
