INQUEST OVER ENG HELD

charged with carrying concealed weapons. He was fined \$50.

It was Loxie's wife, a Chinese woman about 25, who sewed industriously all yesterday afternoon at a machine in one of the Chinese houses. The constant coming and going of the police officers and citizens in her house didn't disturb her. Underneath her were hidden five Chinese, four of whom were armed. About five-thirty she was asked to move; the machine was taken away; the carpet, neatly tacked down, was lifted, and a trap door, bolted underneath, was found. As the men backed away at the floor the Chinese underneath decided it was time to give up and unfasted the lock. Five Chinese were found. Four had revolvers on them. Another revolver was found in a woodshed on the way to the house where the five had secreted themselves. This revolver's magazine was empty and the gun had burrowed into the snow, evidencing that it had been thrown into the snow when still warm. The five Chinese, the woman who sat over them, and the other woman habitant of the house were taken to the county jail where Ching Sing, the Chinese found earlier in the afternoon in a secret cellar hole, had been taken. None have been released.

That two men were shooting yesterday noon is the theory the police now believe. The bullets in Eng's body and the bullet which shattered Mrs. C. E. George's right ankle are not of the same kind. Inasmuch as eyewitnesses to the shooting did not see the man who loaned over Eng change weapons think two gunmen participated.

The police deputized several extra special policemen yesterday and last night to guard the Chinese quarters and to meet trains. An angry crowd of men hung around the Chinese quarters all yesterday and part of last night. Talk of violence to the Chinese because of the injury to Mrs. George was freely made.

Two trunks of Chinese liquor were taken out of Chinese houses last night and carried to police headquarters. In one of the trunk's was a human hand and foot, securely tied together. The trunk belonged to "Mary," said the Chinese laundryman in whose place it was found. The hand and foot, he said, were used, as was the liquor, in a medical ceremony.

Explosions of several giant fire-crackers last night about ten in front of the Chinese houses on Adams avenue and the cries of "Tong war again," brought out people from every building and hurried many to the place from their homes and from other streets. It was a hoax perpetrated by some practical jokers.

Officers and special policemen are watching every train. All Chinese are taken to police headquarters and questioned before being allowed to come into the city.

In very hot weather the baby should nurse very every 4 hours, but give him cooled, water freely between the nursings.
