WHITMAN DECISION DOOMS BOXING IN NEW YORK

New York, March 15.—Any idea any one might have had that boxing wasn't on its last legs and tottering unsteadily to its corner for the final round should be thoroughly dissipated by Gov. Whitman's action in New York when he refused to permit Les Darcy to appear in public bouts.

Whether it will seep into other states and knock the game clear out of the ring is something else and remains for time to tell.

Whitman was severely criticised in many quarters when he took his stand against Darcy, while in other spots he was highly commended.

Critics declared he should not have shown discrimination against Darcy, pointing out that Freddie Welsh, Tom Cowler, Ted Lewis and others are allowed to box without interference. They are just as much at fault as is Darcy, for they are Englishmen, whereas Darcy is an Australian, and of Irish descent.

Whitman's action seems to have been taken because Darcy had neglected his duty to come to America and get some easy money. The spectacle of a foreigner coming here and separating New Yorkers from their cash because they were easy marks evidently didn't appeal to the governor. The other English boxers already were in this country when war was declared.

Darcy made a frightful mistake when he refused to talk business with Mike Gibbons and promoters from the Middle West. Then, when he listened

to bad advice and separated himself from Tim O'Sullivan he made another bad step. Each of these actions caused adverse comment and the people began to kick.

Governor Whitman's attention naturally was called to what was going on. He couldn't have helped seeing it if he read the newspapers. Darcy wasn't complimented by any means in the things said about him. If Governor Whitman got the wrong impression it's his own fault.

The money grubbers among the boxers are fast choking the wind out of the goose that lays the golden egg. It wouldn't be at all surprising if every boxing law in the country was wiped off the books within two or three years.

MRS. GUERNSEY OF KANSAS SEEKS PRESIDENCY OF THE D. A. P.

Washington, March 15.—(United Press)—A battle royal for the Presidency of the Daughters of the American Revolution will be fought by Mrs. George Tacher Guernsey of Independence, Kansas, at the national convention of the D. A. P. here the latter part of next month.

Mrs. Guernsey amazed the national organization by the thoroughness with which she came into the race prepared. It was known she sought the place, but it was not known she had secretly secured the backing of 43 states on the basis of her outlined policy.

Mrs. George G. Squires of St. Paul, Mrs. John Miller Horton of Buffalo, and Mrs. J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois are Mrs. Guernsey's opponents for the presidency which now is filled by Mrs. William Cuming Story of New York. Mrs. Story is said to favor Mrs. Lewis to succeed her.

STOCK SHIPMENTS RESTRICTED

Big Four Takes Precaution in Matter of Perishable Freight.

Indianapolis, March 15.—E. M. Costin, general superintendent of the Big Four Railroad, announced late today that "on account of certain threatening strike conditions, the Big Four Railroad would not accept shipments of livestock and perishable freight after Thursday midnight, unless it could be delivered to destinations on Big Four lines before Saturday noon.

Other classes of freight, the announcement says, will not be accepted after Wednesday midnight, unless the shipper signs a waiver releasing the railroad company from any damages that might be caused by delay.

Brotherhood Decision Secret.
St. Louis, March 14.—Representatives of the four brotherhoods on the Southwestern railway centering in St. Louis, held a four-hour conference here today with National officers of the brotherhoods, and at the end of the conference refused to give out any information as to what had taken place.

Official Censor For the Navy Department

Before our relations with the central European powers became strained news of the movements of the ships of our fleet was easily obtained and freely published. That is so no longer, for nothing is sent out that has not come under the eye of the official censor of the navy. For that duty Lieutenant Commander Charles Belknap, Jr., has been assigned. He has an office in the suit of Rear Admiral Benson, chief of naval

operations, and he is present with Secretary Daniels whenever the latter is interviewed by newspaper men.

The war department has had Major Douglass MacArthur as censor since the Pershing expedition was sent into Mexico. Prior to that Secretary Baker saw the newspaper men twice daily. When Major MacArthur was designated as war department censor Secretary Baker discontinued these daily conferences.

Lieutenant Commander Belknap is a native of Maryland and in his thirty-seventh year. He was appointed to the Naval academy at Annapolis in May, 1890, from Massachusetts, graduating four years later. Since then he has seen much service at sea.
