Highway Meeting Called For Saturday

Hillsboro, Oregon, March 16.—Dr. W. D. Wood, senior member of the legislative committee of eight, appointed to represent the state legislature in preparing the official argu-

ment for the road bond bill, has called a meeting of that committee to be held at the Imperial hotel, Portland, Saturday, March 17.  
 At that time the committee will give formal consideration to proposals that have come in from all parts of the state, asking the committee as the official body representing the legislature in the bonding act, to call a conference for the organization of a state committee or association which

can establish an information headquarters for the bonding campaign.  
 Such a committee would include representatives of local good roads organizations of all the counties of the state.  
 Senator Wood views with favor the moves initiated at Astoria, Eugene, Medford, Pendleton and Redmond to organize state highway associations or district good roads associations.  
 "The main thing," he said today, "is to have some headquarters to issue impartial and authentic information such as is being requested by the different county organizations. Either the different movements for state associations can be joined in the interest of economical management of one headquarters, or they can work separately if the people promoting the different organizations so prefer. There is plenty of work for all to do."  
 "It is important, however, to have one association or committee which is looked to as representing all the counties, and whose authority in furnishing statistical matter and information to the press will command confidence and respect. Such an association should be organized and controlled by delegates from all the counties, and should not merely represent some one section of the state."

**THE RIGHT TO STRIKE.**  
 The threatened railroad strike suggests an important question upon which I would like to receive some light, namely, "Is the right to strike absolute?" That is, have any men the right to strike without regard to the effect on the mutual interests of others, especially when such action involves the tying up of the business of the whole country and thus adversely affect its welfare? It may seem a simple matter, and to be met with the answer that any man has the right to stop working for another, if the conditions under which he works are unsatisfactory to him. But does this answer cover the case? Is there not something more involved? When the issue is simple between two individuals, the effect of a man's ceasing to work is so inconsequential, that it does not arouse attention. It is not until the case becomes more complex and its effects more pronounced, that we begin to consider the merits of the action. The Declaration of Independence states that "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" are inalienable rights. But these rights in the individual are subordinate and conditional to the national welfare as the belligerent nations in Europe have found out. The most constitutional and representative government among them has not hesitated to commandeer the life, liberty and pursuit of happiness of the individual. And the individual with few exceptions, has submitted both willingly and gladly, acknowledging the right of the government so to do, under the circumstances. The position of strikers is one of secession and I do not see any difference in principle from that of the secession of the states. It has been decided that this nation is indivisible, and that no state has the right to secede from the union. The principle which justifies this decision is the same, so it seems to me, that governs the matter of strikes, especially those of nation-wide effect.
