### PRATT ADVISES QUICK DEVELOPMENT OF FOREIGN AUTO MARKET

Washington, March 15.—Warning to American automobile manufacturers to enter the world market before the American market becomes "saturated," was voiced by Dr. Edward Ewing Pratt, chief of the U. S. Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce today.

"If the production of automobiles continues its present rate of increase," Dr. Pratt warns, "and unless vital changes are effected, either in the consuming public or in the price of automobiles, this 'saturation' point may not be far off. For the commercial vehicle, however, development has probably only begun in this country."

American automobiles would have no difficulty in overcoming competition abroad, except possibly in the higher priced cars—above \$1200—Pratt declares. European manufacturers, he said, are not equipped to turn out cars on the extensive and highly efficient basis in effect in the United States.

## What's the Difference Between a Dozen Eggs and a Quart of Milk?

A six-cent egg at a convention of milk enthusiasts would feel like a bad cent. It would immediately go out and get scrambled. Every time a man is asked to say anything about the value of milk he says it's worth a lot more than eggs.

The report of the tri-state milk committee appointed by the governors of Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland give us this information once more. It

says that a quart of milk is equal in food value to eight eggs. And it says that when the consumer pays forty-five cents a dozen for eggs while a quart of milk is worth nine cents he is paying three and three-tenths as much for the same food value. It costs him two and three-fourths times as much for real food when he pays twenty-nine cents a pound for round steak.

What is there about a hen that makes the consumer want to squander his money on her product while he kicks like a steer when the price of milk is advanced a cent? Is it because eggs are solid and milk is liquid? Or is it because the hen makes a noise about her business?
