A nation-wide search is on today, at request of the Chicago police, for Marjorie Delbridge, a pretty little 14-year-old girl whose odd career, climaxed by her sudden disappearance, has earned her the title of "The Child of Mystery."

Since the little girl was three weeks of age she has lived with "Mammy" Camilla Jackson, a negro woman. According to "Mammy" Jackson the child was turned over to her by her dying mother, Miss Davis, an actress, in Atlanta.

A short time ago the juvenile court sought to take Marjorie from her negro "Mammy" and place her in a state school.

It was while Marjorie was visiting at the home of Mrs. Louis Brock, a southern woman in Chicago who wanted to adopt the child, that Marjorie disappeared.

The police are without good clues and at a total loss to explain the mysterious disappearance of the mystery child.

Maybe President Wilson doesn't think it worth while to protect Alex. Q. Jones but the Yankee Doodle boys in Congress will let Germany know where she aights and Alex. Q. Jones will jolly well take his chances.'

The paragrapher of the Pall Mall Gazette did a little better in discussing what he said was recent news from the U. S.

"They now are calling Count von Bernstorff a Spanish athlete" he said. "To understand this you must know that the very latest American slang is throwing the bull. Wherefore one who throws the bull would be a Spanish athlete."

### Lloyd George Will Recognize the New Government.

London, March 19.—(United Press)—Premier Lloyd George indicated that he will move Thursday that the British government congratulate the Russian Duma on the establishment of a new government. He characterized the revolution as "one of the landmarks in the world's history."

### TWENTY-FOUR AMERICANS MISSING.

London, March 19.—(United Press)—The American consular reports showed that twenty-four men are missing from three American steamers submarined. Captain Borum, four Americans and four foreigners from the steamer iCty Memphis, 15 men from the steamer Villagancia are missing. The crew of the tanker Illinois was saved.

Washington, March 19.—(United Press)—The Supreme court upheld Utah's decisions in joining power companies from operating on government land without paying the rates the recent laws prescribe. The government's demand for an accounting of money made by the companies was granted.

A branch of the American high school cadets will be formed at the Baker high school with Birdsell Forsbury as leader, this being decided at the meeting of the students Friday. Further plans will be made later. It is expected that upward of a hundred boys will join the company.
