EASTERN OREGON LIVESTOCK MEN FACE SERIOUS PROBLEM

La Grande, Ore. March 17.—Farmers and stockmen of Eastern Oregon are facing a serious problem in the shortage of feed due to the length and severity of the winter. Ordinarily the snow is gone from the grazing ground by March first but this year is an exception. "There is no relief in sight," writes Charles E. King of Hot Lake and this opinion is shared by farmers and stockmen of Baker, La Grande, Hot Lake Joseph, North Powder, Mt. Glen, Wallowa, Ladd Canyon and other places in answer to a questionnaire sent out by the Observer. Prices for hay range from \$12 a ton to \$35 a ton. Grain is selling at from \$35 to \$40.

Ordinarily a hay and grain country all sections here are now shipping hay, particularly, and some grain, from the outside.
 Not long ago a prominent sheepman of Baker said that a million dollars loss would be suffered by the sheepmen of Baker and Union counties if the snow remained on the ground until April 1st. That particular difficulty under which the sheepmen are now laboring is the inability to get their flocks onto lambing ground. There are no uncovered grass places.
 Straw is being mixed with hay, and sometimes the straw, as on Catherine Creek, and even in the Grande Ronde Valley near Hot Lake, is several years old. The cattle seem glad to get straw.
 One stockman of Catherine Creek last week purchased hay from Albers brothers for \$15 a ton, shipped it by rail to Union, and then hauled it nine miles by road to his range.
 Engle Valley stockmen are offering \$35 a ton for hay—with no takers.
 The snow ranges from three to fifteen feet with a hard crust of nearly two feet on top.
