WALLOWA AND UNION MEN (Continued from Page 1.)

spent in Wallowa county on the same road.

Clarke Leiter, who presided, explained that the meeting had been called at the request of Mr. W. L. Thompson, state highway commissioner, in order that he might learn what the people of Union and Wallowa counties wanted in the way of appropriations from the state highway department.

He explained that at present there would be available under the Bean Barret act and the Shackelford act \$3,600,000 for road purposes in the state, in addition to the 1-4 mill tax now levied for state road purposes. He urged that Union and Wallowa counties work together and co-operate together in order to get appropriations for the La Grande-Joseph road which would be mutually advantageous to both counties.

Other speakers were County Judge Phy who assured those present on behalf of himself and the county commissioners that Union county would appropriate \$5000 for the La Grande-Joseph road, if the state would do the same, and the Federal government would match the state and county appropriation.

Senator Walter M. Pierce spoke in favor of the proposition and made the motion which the Union county delegation favored. Mr. Pierce, while not in favor of the \$6,000,000 bond issue, made a speech in which he showed that he was an earnest advocate of good roads, merely differing with some of those present as to the method of raising the money.

The Wallowa county delegation sketched that they were in favor of good roads and especially the La Grande-Joseph road. Many of them were in favor of the bond issue on the theory that the main trunk highways would have to be built first before good roads could be built into Wallowa county and if the trunk highways were built out of the bonds issue, the post road money would go to post roads like the La Grande-Joseph road.

Nearly every one present was called on for a speech. Although the discussion drifted away from the main purpose of the meeting—the discussion of the La Grande-Joseph road—much information was elicited about the road bond election. Several of those present, Mr. McGolderick, Mr. Davis, Mr. Pierce, and others manifested opposition to the bonds. But all announced that they were in favor of good roads and merely differed as to methods of building and paying for them.

Townley of Union, and County Commissioner Cecil Galloway, of Elgin; J. H. Minnaugh, of Wallowa.
