MANY PROMINENT MEN ARE TRAP SHOOTING ENTHUSIASTS

New York, March 21.—Interesting figures compiled by Peter P. Carney, Philadelphia booster of trap-shooting, show that many men, well known in this country, are ardent devotees of the trap game. Among them he names Vice President Thomas R. Marshall, King George of England, King Alfonso of Spain, King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, Gov. Walter E. Edge of New Jersey, Gov. Brumbaugh of Pennsylvania, Gov. Capper of Kansas, former Gov. Major of Missouri, former Gov. Wert of Oregon, Gov. Ferguson of Texas, John Phillip Sousa, the bandmaster, and many, many lesser lights in the public light. Theodore Roosevelt and Amos Pinchot, Carney writes, are two men who long ago realized the value of outdoor exercise as personified in the use of a gun, but these two, he admits, have never displayed any great hankering for the tame method of killing birds

built of clay. Carney picks out a few mayors for public approval who are trap shooting enthusiasts. Charles A. Fleming, mayor of Spokane, Wash., he says, broke 90 per cent of the targets thrown for him at the Northwest Sportmen's association shoot last summer. R. E. Duval, mayor of Belleville, Ill., a year ago tied for first place in the Southern Trap-shooting Handicap at Memphis. Mayor Thomas B. Smith of Philadelphia, is a member of a gun club and often takes part in contests.
REICHSTAG TO CONSIDER PLANS INCREASING BIRTH RATE
Berlin, March 20.—(United Press)—One of the biggest problems confronting the Reichstag, which reconvened here today is that of increasing the birth rate in Germany. Many radical proposals have been made and the government will sift them all.
The committee of 28 appointed to investigate this matter is expected to report. The more conservative proposals include economic steps to make earlier marriages possible; higher wages, regulation of vice and the limitation of disease, making marriage easier.
Other proposals include heavy beeholder taxes, plural voting rights for men with large families and money premiums for mothers bearing many children.
Another plan is to make professional education courses shorter so young lawyers, doctors and professional men can get established and married before their 25th or 30th year.

Federal Officers Investigate Charges

Accusations Against Dai Gim, ("China Mary.") Chan Sheen and Louie On, Are Sifted.
Assistant Immigrant Inspector P. A. Robbins and Official Interpreter Herman Lowe, of Portland, are hearing evidence here today in the alleged charges of prostitution against two Chinese women. The women are: Dai Gim, known as "China Mary," and Chan Shee. Louie On, husband of Chan Shee, is held on a charge of bringing Chan Shee into this country for an immoral purpose. Chan Shee is the woman who sewed all afternoon last Tuesday over the hole in the Chinese shack in which five Chinese gunmen were found. If the charges are substantiated the punishment for the Chinese may be deportation.

Cove Hay Situation Serious.
Cove, Ore., March 20.—(Special)—The hay situation here is becoming a serious one. The grain farmers have enough hay for their own use but none to spare. The stockmen, with very few exceptions, are out of hay. One stock farmer has gone to Wallawa for the purpose of securing seven carloads of baled hay to be shipped into Cove at once, and many others are compelled to buy hay from other localities and still others are without hay and do not know where they will be able to buy any. The present price for hay is \$15 a ton but in all probability will reach \$18 or \$20 before grass comes. Grain seems to be plentiful among the farmers but the price is high.

Fourth Class Postmaster Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on Saturday, April 14 an examination will be held at La Grande, Ore., as a result of which it is expected to make certifications to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Summerville, Ore., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$390 for the last fiscal year.
Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination with the exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.
Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced.
The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.
Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Summerville or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.
Applications should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington at least seven days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.
