ternal greetings of the W. R. C.'s auxiliary and the G. A. R. and of presenting to you in their name "Our Country's Flag." Perhaps you do not know that the placing of flags on every school house in this broad country of ours is accredited to the W. R. C. and that we are actively engaged in teaching patriotism to the children of our public schools. With the vast army of children daily saluting the flag it speaks well for the future harvest of loyal, patriotic citizens. We began our work as a national body over thirty years ago. Side by side with the comrades work the W. R. C. sharing their works of charity, aiding in the sacred duties of Memorial day, ever striving to meet the approval of the grandest organization in the nation, the G. A. R. "Our Country's Flag!" It stands for all those things for which we praise the President of the U. S. and all the Presidents that have gone before. I love to think it is not alone for the wondrous beauty of the "Stars and Stripes," that we pay it homage, not because of the richness of its red, the azure of its blue, the purity of its white, the symmetry of its radiant stars nor the gracefulness of its stripes, that hats are doffed whenever and wherever it is seen floating in the breeze; but that we revere it for all the lofty things for which it stands in the sight of God and man. We revere it for the history it represents, the message it brings to the down-trodden, the promise of hope it holds out for all the people of the earth. This is the same flag that now is greeted from sunrise to sunrise around the world; the same flag that at every military post of our army, and on every ship of our navy lowers at sunset to the strains of "The Star Spangled Banner." Steam Used To Extinguish Flaming Gas Well.

Nine boilers recently furnished a flow of steam used in extinguishing a burning gas well near Blackwell, Okla., which had been ignited by an electric spark. Ten days were spent by a large crew of men in mastering the fire and capping the well, which has a flow of about 20,000,000 cu. ft. a day. When the steam had reduced the flames sufficiently to permit it, the iron cap—or "snuffer" as it is called in gas-field vernacular—was moved forward by horses and dropped into place.—From the March Popular Mechanics Magazine.
