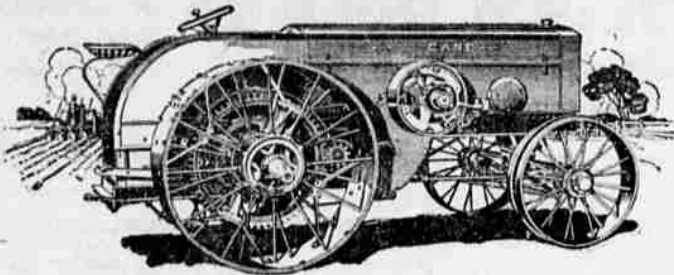

**Phil Bates Takes
Trip For Publishers**

Oregon Publishers Have Recently Organized in Order to Present Their Case to Advertisers.

Phillip S. Bates of Portland Oregon, secretary of the Oregon Daily Newspaper Publishers' association was in Janesville, Sunday, on business for his organization. Mr. Bates is making a trip through all the principal cities of the middle west and east in the interest of his association, distributing commercial surveys of the cities represented by his papers and giving information as to how to cover the state of Oregon with publicity. The Oregon association is patterned after the Wisconsin Daily League and is comprised of the following papers:

Corvallis, Gazette Times; Oregon City, Morning Enterprise; Astoria, Evening Budget; Marshfield, Coos Bay Times; Roseburg, Roseburg Review; Grants Pass, Rogue River Courier; Eugene, Eugene Daily Guard; Oregon Statesman; Salem, Capital Journal; Pendleton, East Oregonian; Pendleton, Evening Tribune; La Grande, Evening Observer; The Dalles, The Dalles Chronicle; Bend, Bend Bulletin.

This adds one more state to those in which the publishers of daily newspapers have equipped themselves for instant service to the general advertiser. Indiana has recently formed the Hoosier State Daily League; Illinois, has its daily league; West Virginia organized in January; Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota and Michigan are working into daily publishers' associations. These organizations are proving a boom to general advertisers who wish to cover the country, state by state, and at the same time pay for only the territory desired and covered, without any waste.

Mr. Bates believes that soon the inland daily newspapers, through these organizations, will enter the field of development work and present the claims of daily newspapers to the manufacturer with such a mass of detailed commercial data and plans of co-operation, as to outrival anything yet attempted by any medium of publicity. These leagues are doing this work individually, at present; collectively, their strength will be enormous.—Janesville, Wis., Gazette, March 5, 1917.

To Fred E. Wright and Jessie M. Wright, the above named defendants: IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons (which first publication of summons is on the second day of March, 1917,) and if you fail so to appear or to answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint. A substantial statement of the relief demanded in the complaint is that plaintiff, being the owner and holder of a certain promissory note, dated November 26th, 1915, due six months after date, for \$272.60, with interest after date at the rate of ten per cent. per annum, until paid, payable to the order of this plaintiff, and executed and delivered to plaintiff by Fred E. Wright, defendant, and also of a certain promissory note dated November 26th, 1915, for \$20.50, with interest after date at the rate of ten per cent. per annum, until paid, payable to the order of this plaintiff, and executed and delivered by Fred E. Wright, defendant, will demand judgment against said defendant, Fred E. Wright, for the full sums due upon said notes, together with costs and disbursements incurred by plaintiff, and the sum of \$50.00, reasonable attorney's fees, it being alleged in said complaint that no part of the principal interest on said notes has been paid. And plaintiff will further ask the court to reform, declare and decree that certain warranty deed of defendants, made and executed to plaintiff, on or about the 20th day of February, 1915, and duly recorded in book 60 of the records of deeds of Union County, Oregon, at page 568 thereof, conveying lots three, four and five

in block 23, in Williamson's Addition to La Grande, Union County, Oregon, to this plaintiff, alleged in said complaint to have been executed and delivered to plaintiff by said defendants to secure the plaintiff in the payment of an indebtedness of defendants, due plaintiff, theretofore created and existing, and evidenced by said two certain promissory notes, to be in fact a mortgage, and that such deed, so decreed to be a mortgage, be foreclosed and the above described property sold according to law and the proceeds thereof applied to the payment of any judgment secured against defendants, or either of them, for the payment of the above mentioned sums, and the defendants and each thereof, be barred and foreclosed of all right, title and interest in and to said premises, except the statutory right of redemption.
