Early Days In The Grande Ronde Valley

 The first travel through the canyon south of Union to North Powder was made by pack animals carrying goods from Walla Walla to the Powder river mines, and this was in 1862. A year or so later a man named James Pyle constructed a grade for a wagon road and secured a charter for a toll road which was operated as such until about 1870 when it was bought out by the county and turned into a public highway. The canyon received its name from the early toll road proprietor, James Pyle.
 What was known as the old emigrant road came into the valley from the crest of the hills west of Hot Lake. It was the road traveled by those headed for the Willamette valley in 1852 and later years. At the point where the road came into the valley an immigrant and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. John Ladd, who were among the first of the Grande Ronde settlers, established an eating station where good, substantial meals were served at a dollar each. The name of the canyon followed that of the man who conducted the pioneer Delmonico. He was a brother of Freeman Ladd, of La Grande. Mrs. Ladd, afterwards known as Mrs. Hilt, was the chef of the establishment. She is now a resident of Portland.
 The name "Cove" as suggestive of a sheltered mountain recess is so appropriate to the locality on the east side of the valley that any other appellation would seem to have been

foretold on the start. There was an early attempt to improve on the short and easy title by designating this locality as "Forest Cove." The "Forest" part, however, was soon dropped and has neither been used nor heard of for years.
 "Starkey Prattle" was the former name of the locality up the Grande Ronde river which has gone into the postal guide as just plain "Starkey." It was named in honor of John and William Starkey, who were among the first settlers in that section. They were brothers and both have been dead for upwards of thirty years.
 Oro Dell was named by Capt. Harlow, one of the earliest of the early day pioneers who remained here but a short time. "Oro" is unquestionably from the Greek "Oros," a mountain, and "Oro Dell" becomes descriptively a retired nook of the mountains or a nook in the mountains, either of which is good enough and leaves no room for doubt that the proponent of this name was familiar with the classics.
 One of the early day sawmill men of the valley was named Fox and he operated a mill at Oro Dell. A large part of his lumber supply came from the northern hillside which has since been known by the name of the lumberman. In the early times the Fox hill road continued on over the mountains and most of the Grande Ronde settlers who came here from the Willamette came by way of the Fox hill

road instead of the longer circuit necessary to come into the valley by way of the old emigrant road at La Grande.
 The settlement which was begun by Benjamin Brown, the first settler of Grande Ronde, was known as Brown-town and in the establishment of a postoffice in 1863 it was discovered there was another postoffice with a similar name and a change was suggested. A Frenchman, Charles Dause, suggested the name "La Grande," and thus it was and ever has been since.
