La Follette Supporters of Monroe Get Eight Questions Before Populace

Monroe, Wis., March 27.—(Special)—The first official referendum on the question of war with Germany to be held in the United States will enable the 1000 voters of Monroe to register their verdict at the city election on April 3.

Supporters of Senator La Follette's stand on the arming of American merchantmen obtained permission for the referendum from the city council. Several other questions touching upon President Wilson's international policy will be submitted to the voters of Monroe, more than half of which are of Swiss descent.

The questions are:
First—Should the United States at the outbreak of the war have compelled England, France and Germany to respect international law and American rights?

Second—Should the government warn American citizens that in taking passage on belligerent vessels they do so at their own risk?

Third—Should the government guarantee belligerent nations that all neutral vessels leaving American ports do not carry contraband and are entitled to the freedom of the seas?

Fourth—Should the government provide clearance papers for vessels carrying both passengers and contraband?

Fifth—Should congress authorize the president to arm American merchantmen?

Sixth—Should congress appropriate money to arm American merchantmen and convey them to belligerent ports through blockades and war zones?

Seventh—Since England has violated international law by mining the North Sea, shall we now, at any cost, prevent Germany from violating international law by destroying our commerce with England?

Eighth—Under existing circumstances, do you favor a declaration of war against Germany?
