Things to Remember

22 size buttonholes in lace place a tiny square of lawn under the lace where you wish the buttonhole and work through it. After completing the buttonhole cut away the lawn.

To avoid tatters when hanging sheets to dry fold the ends together and pin on line instead of hanging from the middle. You will thus avoid frayed corners.

Crochet thread of any of the different shades—blue, pink, yellow, lavender—may be prevented from fading by soaking in strong salt water before being washed.

Time will be saved by mixing up a quantity of sugar and cinnamon and putting it in a spice can on the shelf. It will be handy for sprinkling over cinnamon rolls, coffee cakes, baked apples, bread puddings, etc.

For cleaning white kid shoes a lather made of pure white soap and milk is excellent. Brush off as much dirt as possible before scrubbing with the lather.

To cool jellies or blancmange in a short time take a handful of salt and the same of soda, put it in a bowl of water and stand the jelly mold in it.

Common Cold Is Often Dangerous and Expensive

Just a common cold is not a simple matter for more reasons than one, says the North Carolina board of health. It used to be considered, however, quite

natural and perfectly normal for first one and then another of a family to have a cold all winter long. Today, such a condition would be thought of in such terms as abnormal, disgraceful and dangerous.

Colds are not to be trifled with, first, because they predispose to so many other diseases. They weaken the body and decrease its resistance, making it easy for ordinary colds to "run into" pneumonia, grippe, bronchitis, rheumatism or tuberculosis. Again, there is danger of the cold organism getting into the blood stream, causing fever and other complications.

Another consideration not often taken into account with the "common cold" is the economic loss it entails.

To prevent colds is more or less a matter of personal hygiene, but to keep cool and avoid people with colds are probably the two most general and safest rules one can adopt. A daily cold bath about the neck and shoulders is fairly effective, as is also temperance in eating and drinking.
