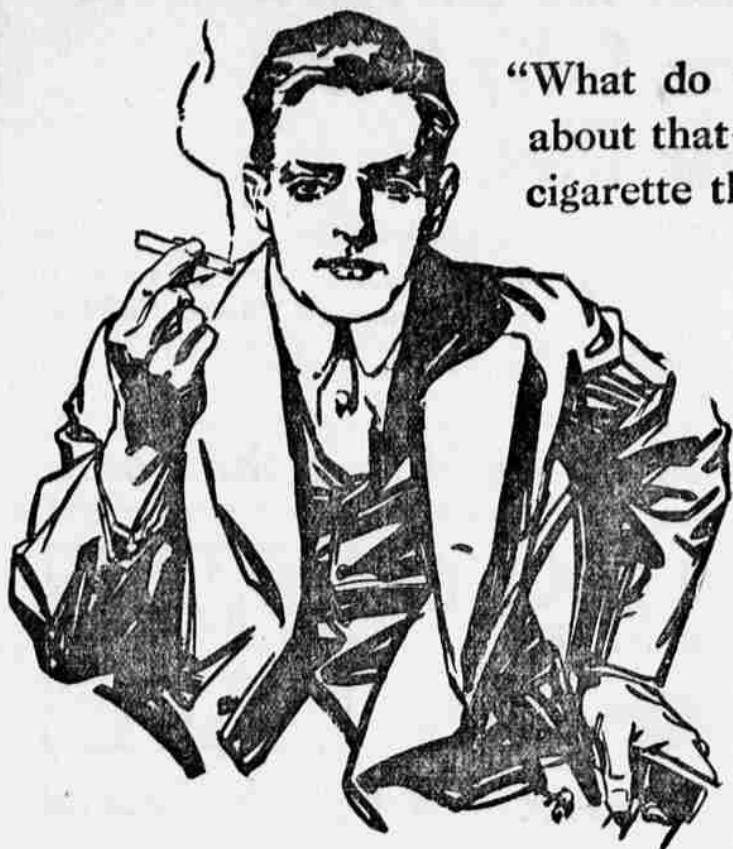

U. S. PROFESSORS AFRAID OF BRAZILIAN REVOLUTIONS
Rio de Janeiro, March 1.—(By mail) —United Press)—Nine agricultural experts recently employed in the United States by the Brazilian Department of Agriculture, have just arrived in Brazil.
According to the story told by Sr. Oliveira Castro, the Brazilian government's agent sent to employ the experts he had extreme difficulty in finding men willing to go to Brazil because of the prevailing idea in the United States that revolutions were matters of daily occurrence.
After a great deal of effort and repeated assurances that revolutions took place only in the story books and not in actual Brazilian life, he induced Professors O. T. Clawson, H. H. Cardinell, W. C. Johnstone, J. E. Blohm, E. Pithman, R. H. Cook, Maurice Blohm, Dr. K. E. Qunatz and Dr. B. T. Harve to leave with him on the steamer "Minas Geraes."
When the "Minas Geraes" arrived in Pernambuco, the first Brazilian port, and as she hauled up to the docks there was the sound of rifle firing from within the city. There was great curiosity on board the ship, particularly among the Americans as to what the disturbance meant. A venture some ship's officer brought back the news that a revolution was in progress. It turned out later that it was a mere celebration over a minor election and nobody was hurt.
But, as Sr. Castro expressed it, "The Americans clapped their hands to their heads."
They arrived safely in Rio de Janeiro and are busy showing the Agricultural Department new stunts in fruit, grain, tobacco and other kinds of culture.

What's the Difference Between a Dozen Eggs and a Quart of Milk?

A six-cent egg at a convention of milk enthusiasts would feel like a bad cent. It would immediately go out and get scrambled. Every time a man is asked to say anything about the value of milk he says it's worth a lot more than eggs.

The report of the tri-state milk committee appointed by the governors of Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland give us this information once more. It

says that a quart of milk is equal in food value to eight eggs. And it says that when the consumer pays forty-five cents a dozen for eggs while a quart of milk is worth nine cents he is paying three and three-fourths as much for the same food value. It costs him two and three-fourths times as much for real food when he pays twenty-nine cents a pound for round steak.

What is there about a hen that makes the consumer want to squander his money on her product while he kicks like a steer when the price of milk is advanced a cent? Is it because eggs are solid and milk is liquid? Or is it because the hen makes a noise about her business?
