Salem, March 29.—(United Press) —Labor Commissioner Hoff transferred W. A. Dalziel, Deputy to Eastern Oregon, to the Coast succeeding C. H. Gram, whose resignation was demanded and received M. H. Allen of Sumpter, succeeds Dalziel.

"Since Gram stated his resignation was submitted by request," said Commissioner Hoff, "I will say it's my principle to conduct my office in the interest of efficiency. To do this it was necessary to ask Gram's resignation."

Buried Five Months After

Salem, Ore., Mar. 30.—Five months after death, William Burrill was buried yesterday. At the time of his death, October 19, 1916, relatives in Big Timber, Mont., sent word to hold the body until the All Saints church of which Mr. Burrill was a member, could arrange for burial.
