WHY KILBANE IS NOT POPULAR IN THE EAST

New York, March 30.—A short time ago Johnny Kilbane came east to fight. He was matched with a young lightweight before a Syracuse, N. Y., club and he agreed to allow this man to enter the ring weighing 133 pounds, but when it came weighing time and the young opponent of the feather-

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ed almost ten pounds more than himself.
Any man," he said, "featherweight or no featherweight, who challenges Freddie Welsh for the world's lightweight title and agrees to let that champion come into the ring weighing 135 pounds should not be afraid to meet a comparatively unknown man who weighs 137 pounds."
Now this fight fan may have been at the ringside during the should-have been Syracuse fight, and he may not. If he was, there was an excuse for his complaint, although it was a lame one. But it is a certainty that he didn't take into consideration the fact that this youth may have been a very hard hitter, one capable of putting over the sleep wallop on Kilbane's chin. Welsh, as it is well known, long ago lost the habit of knocking out his opponents. He never even bruises most of the men he meets.
Whether Kilbane was right or wrong, it is a brass riveted cinch that he did the best thing to protect what little reputation is left him in a New York ring. Criticism of the kind the fight fan made are the very things which have discounted Kilbane's ability here. Whenever New York gets to the point of accepting Kilbane at his real worth, which is almost his weight in gold, it will see some good fights—something it does not see when Freddie Welsh and some of the other high priced lads get into action.

State Game Officers Here To Confer Upon Local Conditions

Fish Ladder at Perry and Stocking of Wallowa Lake To Be Discussed by Messrs. Shoemaker, Clanton and Jack.
State Fish and Game Commissioner Marion Jack of Pendleton and Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton are in the city on their way to Joseph where they will confer with State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker, over fish and game matters of this section. Mr. Shoemaker is showing illustrated pictures of state birds and animals in the cities along the Joseph branch.
The three men will particularly confer in regard to the fish ladder at Perry and the stocking of Wallowa Lake with blueback and lake trout. The fish ladder, the state officials are informed, is four feet out of the water at times and fishermen here have said that not a fish has gone up the ladder in the past five years.
Out of a million lake trout eggs which were received at the Bonneville hatchery about 900,000 fry have been obtained and it is planned to stock Wallowa Lake with these fry. The officials will also take up with the men owning ditches leading out of Wallowa Lake the use of a new screening which will prevent the blueback to be planted again in the lake, from turning into the ditches and becoming stranded. "We believe we have a suitable screen now," said Mr. Clanton this morning, "and we hope to stock Wallowa Lake with bluebacks. We hope again to have the famous red fish in this region."
